MAN WHO TRIED TO SHOOT HIS FRIEND IN THE PEN.

Quarreled Over a Game of Cards, Bullets Flew and Kelly Was "Pinched"—Straw Day.

Walla Walla, July 30.—James Kelly, set ranger in this city, has begun serving a term of two years in the state penitentiary for assaulting with a revolver James Tracy, also a stranger. The two men arrived here Monday and the same evening engaged in a game of cards and drinking beer in a local saloon.

Trouble occurred, but no one knows just how. The first thing anyone knew, Kelly attempted to shoot Tracy, and as he was fleeing from the gun, two shots were fired, neither doing damage. Kelly was arrested and gave his name as "Bug House" Kelly, recently escaped from an insane asylum at San Francisco.

Yesterday he was arraigned in the superior court, and immediately pled guilty. A sentence of two years was passed by Judge Brents, and Kelly has begun his term of servitude. Tracy claimed in court that he was drunk and did not know what he was doing when the trouble occurred.

TIMBER CRUISERS HURT.

Establishment of Timber Reserve Cuts into Their Business.

The setting aside of the watershed of the John Day, Powder, Grand Ronde and Burnt Rivers, as a forest reserve, has completely demoralized the plans of timber locators operating in those sections. The territory embraced in the reserve contains some of the finest belts of pine timber in the world and timber men here for some time realized that the timber is worth millions.

The cruisers do not take kindly to the reserve proposition and see in it a complete ending of the large revenues they have been receiving from prospective timber locators. Many of them have already made snug sums and are still going ahead in the locating business, claiming that either there is no truth in the report of the reserve establishment or that the order has no bearing on the land they are locating.

As soon as the news was received by those in the sections affected, that the territory in question had been set aside there was much wailing and all who understand what such an order means have desisted from attempting any further locations.

Cruisers are going ahead just the same and it is possible some unwary individuals will be found who are willing to pay a good sum for having a fine piece of timber land pointed out to them.
