## COX'S THIRD TERM

WALLA WALLA PRISON IS HOME FOR "BUD" COX.

The Notorious Burglar Now Has a Term Which Will Hold Him for a While—Other Town News.

Walla Walla, July 31.—For the third time in less than nine years, "Bud" Cox, a notorious character from Snohomish county, was yesterday incarcerated in the state penitentiary here. Cox is a confirmed burglar, and is now serving his third term for the crime, committed in his home county, in each instance. This time he has 20 years ahead of him, and he will be an old man when he breathes free air again.

Cox made his first appearance at the prison October 2, 1893, with a year to his credit. He served the time with credit and was given the advantage of two months liberty. After being released he went back to Snohomish county, and again fell into bad habits. On September 13, 1895, he returned to the prison here with 10 years hanging over his head. He served the time, but for many months gave trouble as a crazy man, shamming with a carelessness seldom seen. Several doctors examined him and pronounced him insane. Finally the sham leaked out, and Cox had to go to work with the other prisoners. February 28, last, Cox was released and he again returned to the scenes of his former crimes. Yesterday he came back to his old cell with 20 long years staring him in the face. All

three sentences have been pronounced by the same superior court.

### Hot Winds Blew.

A touch of the dreaded "hot wind" was felt in this section yesterday afternoon, and for a time farmers were agitated lest damage should result. For a few minutes the hot air swept across the fields, but it did not last long enough to do any damage. The excessive heat of the last two weeks has alarmed some of the people lest the hot winds come and do damage to the late spring grain, which is not yet fully ripe. A lot of shriveled grain might result, even though the quantity be not lessened.

### A Happy Wedding.

William L. Stirling and Miss Myrtle Isabel Brents, both of this city, were married at 7 o'clock last evening at St. Paul's Episcopal Church. The wedding was of the most formal sort, and was witnessed by scores of intimate friends of the parties. Rev. Andreas Bard, rector of St. Paul's, performed the ceremony. Following the ceremony the happy couple and their many friends repaired to the home of the bride, where a sumptuous wedding dinner was served and a reception given. Mr. Stirling is a young business man of this city, and his bride is the daughter of Hon. and Mrs. Thomas H. Brents. The young couple will reside in this city.

### BOOK OF ROYAL BLUE.

### TO RAISE HOGS.

Mayville Farmers Will Devote Much Attention to Pork Raising.

A number of farmers in the vicinity of Mayville, Gilliam county, have decided to take advantage of the conditions surrounding them and instead of growin wheat exclusively, they will devote a good part of their attention to the raising of hogs.

The people of this district are from 50 to 60 miles from a railroad shipping point. This portion of Gilliam county is a good wheat country. The yields are large and the quality is excellent, but the long distance to haul the wheat by teams, takes away a great portion of the profit.

The farmers will continue to grow wheat, but instead of hauling it 50 or 60 miles, will feed it to hogs and market pork which will do away with a great deal of the expense in freight.

This is a business proposition in which the Mayville farmers will succeed. The fact that Portland imports annually 9,000,000 pounds of hams and bacon, worth \$1,250,000, and 3,000,000 pounds of lard worth \$425,000, is strong argument in favor of hog raising.

Besides this home demand, Puget Sound and Alaska import from Eastern packing houses each year 36,000,000 pounds of baco and lard.
