THE HARVEST HANDS

ALL CLASSES AND CONDITIONS OF MEN IN FIELDS.

Men Who Harvest the Golden Grain Come From Highest as Well as Lowest States of Society—Wages Are Good.

Among the men who come into this section of the country to work in the harvest fields a surprising amount of variety may be noticed. To the casual observer who sees these men grouped about a street corner awaiting the coming of some farmer in search of "hands," or busily at work about a huge steam combine, or thrasher or separator, begrimed with dirt and sweat, and all tolling in one common cause, there is to be a general similarity broken only by minor variations of physical features.

The man who lives and labors among them, joins them in their sports after working hours—and rough sports they are too—and shares their slumbers in barn loft or hay stack, soon discovers that among the harvesters there are as sharply drawn and well defined lines of society as among the upper-crust and leaders of swiftdom.

All Classes and Conditions.

These men are of all conditions and classes, of all nationalities, and of all degrees of intelligence. In one harvesting crew may be found the most ignorant of Finnish or Hungarian immigrants and the remnants of once popular and successful college students, or even ex-business men who have been unable to keep up with the tide of modern progress.

Some are there from lack of early training to perform other than manual labor, some for the novelty of the thing, some from sheer necessity, some because King Alcohol has them in his grasp so firmly that they can not fill the positions of trust for which they were trained and educated, can in fact hold no position permanently and have thus been driven to the lower levels of the laboring world to maintain themselves.

Skilled Mechanics There.

Others again just as dirty and sweat begrimed as the lowest of their fellows, are skilled mechanics, earning sums of money which would look fabulous to many a white shirted and silken necked clerk or bookkeeper who would turn aside to avoid brushing against the toll besmeared wage earner, were they to meet him on the streets.

The wages paid harvest hands varies in different localities and also according to the character of the work being performed. In Umatilla county hardly a man in the harvest field earns less than \$2 per day and expenses, and the wages run from that figure for the commonest labor, to \$8 per day for the men who tend the separators.

Briefly summed up the wages of harvest hands may be said to average nearly \$3 per day.

Wages are Good.

The common laborer, draws \$2 daily, the team driver from \$2.50 to \$3.50 according to the number of horses handled and the character of his work, the straw-buck, where one is used, earns \$4 and \$4.50 per day—and earns every cent of it—the sack sewer is paid from \$3 to \$4.50 or even \$5 daily according to his experience and skill, while the top wages go to the men who handle the engines on

the steam combines and those who tend the separators, their daily stipends ranging from \$5 to \$8. Other employes about the fields get \$3 to \$3.50 per day. A good harvest cook gets easily \$60 to \$75 per month, with a strong demand throughout the season.

Demand For Men is Good.

Just at present the demand for men in all grades of the work is extremely good and such signs as "Men wanted for Harvest," "Wanted water tender for separator engine," "Good cook for harvest fields wanted," may be seen at nearly every street corner, while some farmers are so anxious to secure men that they drive their hay racks through the streets calling for anyone desiring work to climb on the wagon and go with them.

A Warm Time on Pay Day.

These men draw their money as each field is harvested and the great majority of them come to town to spend it just as soon as they draw. For a few days they paint the town a brilliant vermilion, then back to the harvest fields for another bout with the golden grain.

Pythians Coming West.

Columbus, O., Aug. 2.—A half dozen special coaches making up the "Ohio Brigade Special," will be pulled out of Columbus tomorrow morning en route to San Francisco. The train will bear the delegations from this city, Toledo, Cleveland and other points in the state to the meeting of the supreme lodge Knights of Pythias, to be held in San Francisco the week beginning Aug. 10. The trip will be made by way of Kansas City, Denver and Salt Lake City, and brief stops will be made at these points to enable the tourists to do some sight-seeing.
