GENERAL NEWS.

England is worried for fear that Trinidad island will come under the United States flag.

The grave diggers are the latest of the wage earners of Chicago to go on a strike, and as a result Concordia cemetery is closed and at the gate to the burial grounds the superintendent has posted a notice which reads: "There will be no more burials at the Concordia cemetery until further notice."

Fire has appeared at the fourth level of the United Verde mine at Jerome, Colo., the fumes of the burning sulphur pervading the entire mine. An attempt has been made to bulkhead the level, but with the air pumped from the surface, the men could only work for a few minutes at a time.

President Lederle, of the New York health board, has decided to wage a systematic and scientific warfare against mosquitos. He will assign 17 inspectors to go over all the territory in the malaria districts of New York. They will make maps of ponds and indicate wherever there is pool of stagnant water. Twenty-five barrels of oil will be placed on the water in Central park.

Samuel Randall, a cattleman of Florence, Colo., while riding on the prairie south of Granada, Colo., near the Kansas line, found the body of a Mexican shepherd, who had been murdered. His heart had been cut out and thrust in his mouth. The man's herd of sheep had been scattered. The crime is thought to have been due to trouble between sheep and cattle owners.

The body of Mrs. Julia C. Howell, the Chicago woman who committed suicide in Denver Friday, reached Chicago Saturday, accompanied by a lady friend, of Denver. It was learned that Mrs. Howell, while on her way West a few days ago, stopped in Chicago long enough to purchase a lot in Prospect Hill cemetery, and a marble monument from a local dealer. So far as can be learned, the woman had no relatives in that city, although she had made every arrangement to be buried there. Mrs. Howell left a note, saying ill health was the cause of her act. She appeared to be a woman of culture and refinement.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The first wheat of the season has been marketed at Albany.

Hillsboro is to have a condensed milk factory by December 1.

It is reported that a stamp mill is to be erected at the Mammoth mine, Baker City, shortly.

The Miller House, the largest hotel at Tekoa, Wash., was destroyed by fire Saturday afternoon. Loss, \$15,000; insurance, \$6000.

It is stated that the O. R. & N. Co. is preparing to erect more large buildings on the Albina terminal grounds in the near future.

The county commissioners of Multnomah county are anxiously looking for competent men to tend the bridges under the supervision of that county.

The Centennial Flouring mill at Spokane, with a daily capacity of 700 barrels of flour and 200 barrels of cereal foods, was destroyed by fire Saturday morning.

About 20 tons of hay recently cured and baled by J. E. Murphy, was burned near Salem Saturday evening. The fire caught from a spark from the engine which furnished power for the baler.

Governor Geer Saturday appointed A. L. Craig and A. D. Charlton, both of Portland, to represent the state of Oregon at the International Mining Congress, to be held at Butte, Mont., September 1 to 5.

A LOSE AND A WIN

INDIANS LOST SATURDAY, BUT WON SUNDAY.

First-Named Game Was Good for Six Innings, But Players Lost Temper in Seventh—Sunday Game Was a Red-Hot Coker.

It looked very much as though Pendleton had the men from the mines shut out Sunday, but in the ninth inning the Gold Diggers started something which the Indians came very near not being able to stop.

Taylor pitched championship ball for eight innings and only four scattered hits were made off him, but in the almost fatal ninth "Slat" was all in and the visitors landed on him for three singles and a double, which with the assistance of two errors allowed six runs. Only one more would have tied the score and when the third man was put out in the last inning one could hear on every hand sighs of relief and see smiles on faces which had been frozen with anxiety during the painful moments when Baker was crawling up.

Thomas was pounded about in a lively manner, even "Slat" getting two hits off his delivery. The support given each pitcher was good, many sensational stops and catches being made. The work done by Pendleton's outfield was splendid and was only marred by the error of Hammond in taking a difficult chance. This fielder, however, made some brilliant catches during the game.

Schills led off with a corking three-base hit to center, which he tried to stretch into a home run, but was caught at the home plate. The next two men did not reach first.

Schmidt, in the second, soaked another three-bagger to the middle garden and scored after Clemens had caught Adams' fly.

The Indians got busy in the third. Brown struck out, but got to second on a passed ball. Taylor, Fay and Schmidt each got singles, which scored Brown, Taylor and Fay.

The fourth and fifth were uneventful, but in the sixth Hammond hit safe and reached third when "Clem" let the ball go by. Wilner brought Hammond in, but was himself thrown out at first.

Schills got another three-base hit in the next inning, and was brought across the plate by a single by Fay.

The last run of the Indians came in the eighth. Adams was passed to first and went to third when Thomas threw wild to first. He scored after Hupp caught Wilner's long fly to center.

In the eighth innings Baker got seven men on bases, but only got one past second. It was in the ninth that the glorious burst of fireworks occurred. L. Mahaffey opened the display with a two-base hit, and scored when Hammond failed to hold Woods' line drive. G. Brown, Thomas and Crawford each got singles and Ferris was safe at first on fielder's choice. Hupp knocked a long fly to center field which Brown caught after a hard run, but those who had not already scored came in before the ball got back.

Clemens tried to prolong the agony with a long fly near the right field fence, but Bob Wilner got under it and the bird of victory again perched on the banner of the Indians.

The game was so alive with fine catches, quick throws and difficult stops that it is too hard to pick out any one play especially deserving of mention.
