THE THIRTEENTH SESSION

TRANS-MISSISSIPPI COMMERCIAL CONGRESS TO CONVENE.

Organization Has Dignity of Being Greatest Commercial Movement in the Country, Affecting Commerce of Western States.

The thirteenth annual session of the Trans-Mississippi Commercial Congress convenes August 19 to 22, inclusive, in St. Paul, Minnesota.

This organization has the dignity of being the greatest commercial movement in the country having for its consideration and recommendation only such measures as affect the prosperity and growth of the states and territories west of the Mississippi river, including, of course, the recently acquired possessions in the Pacific ocean.

As its name implies, the congress is purely a commercial organization, taboos politics. This rule is rigidly enforced by a constitution that has stood the test of the past fifteen years, a period which has been peculiarly fruitful of discussions more or less acute upon national measures.

The delegates comprising the membership of this body are appointed, first, by the governor selecting ten of the most influential men of his state; the mayor selecting five from the most prominent citizens in his city; the board of county commissioners selecting three of the influential men from their county; the commercial, industrial and other associations selecting from among their membership one influential citizen for every 100 members of the organization.

These delegates, acting under the call issued by the executive committee gather at the appointed place, welcomed by the commercial organizations of the city which extends the invitation, and form a remarkable gathering, the deliberations of which upon even a greater plan than those which characterize the lawmaking bodies of the country.

In fact, it is, as the record of the past 15 years shows, it is a lawmaking body unto itself, for so high is its reputation in Washington that its unqualified indorsement of any particular measure, recommended for action to the congress of the United States, is at once considered, as the sentiment of the 24 States and territories comprising the jurisdiction known as the Trans-Mississippi area.

HORSES SCARCE.

The Animals are Reported to be Hard to Get.

Liverymen and horsebuyers who come into Eastern Oregon from the western part of the state are complaining because they find the supply of good horses for their purposes growing short in this section and prices rising correspondingly.

Speaking along these lines ex-Sheriff Frazier, of Multnomah county, who has been in the eastern part of the state buying up a lot of horses for general purposes, said to the Portland Telegram the other day he found horses scarce and high this trip as stockmen quit breeding in the dull time, when the price of horses dropped. In this they made a mistake, Mr. Frazier thinks, as the lapse of several years in horse-breeding is now being felt when the growing industries of the country require more horses than ever before.

"A few years ago all the horses fit for cavalry use were bought up by agents of the American and English governments," Mr. Frazier said, "and this left a scarcity of these. At present no one is buying cavalry horses, as all the wars are over, but I still notice how closely the animals were bought up in Eastern Oregon."

"The coming harvest will require all the work horses east of the mountains, and the big farmers of Umatilla county are buying up horses instead of selling them. I had considerable difficulty in procuring what animals I did."

"Horse raising is like everything else. When horses are high, everybody tries to raise some, but when the price drops, breeding stops, when it should keep right on."

"The price of horses has advanced 50 per cent over that of five years ago, and the demand comes from the logging camps of Oregon and Washington, from the cities of Puget Sound and from Alaska. Portland has become great headquarters for the sale of horses, and I am constantly receiving letters from people all over the Northwest, who desire to buy. Besides this, Portland herself uses a great many and the depletions must be kept up from year to year. I look for good prices for horses for several years to come."

pests than he does harm in killing sheep. Since 140,000 coyotes have been killed off, and the rabbits and gophers have multiplied, perhaps the remaining coyotes can now find food in plenty without attacking sheep."

There is no weight in this argument. Any person who understands the nature of a coyote knows that these animals would walk over a path of rabbits and gophers to get a taste of mutton. Western Oregon papers would make believe that the coyote is a benefit instead of a pest. There is only one logical way to look at the matter. If the coyote is a benefit to the state of Oregon then repeal the bounty law as soon as possible. If it is a pest, then continue the law. This is the whole proposition. The coyote is an enemy to one of the great industries of the state. This is a well known fact. The scalps brought in are sufficient proof that the law is bringing desired results. Three years ago where coyotes were very thick, today they are scarce. The advocates of the scalp bounty law point to these facts. The only objection to the law is that it costs the state something. Eastern Oregon pays her share of state expenses without complaint no matter what part of the state is benefited.—Happner Gazette.
