### NAMES OF 367 TRANSGRES-SORS ARE ON CITY BOOKS.

WHO BROKE

Since First of Year That Number Have Explained Things to Justice McCourt and \$1464 Came Into the City Treasury From Fines.

The names of 367 law-breakers are on the record book at the police head Prof. W. B. Mathews called the gathquarters, which have been entered ering to order and President C. H there since the present year was ushered in.

Out of these the city treasury has been enriched to the amount of \$1464. This only lacks \$4 of being \$4 a head for the number of arrrests. Of course, not all of those arrested paid fines. Perhaps not more than twothirds paid and the rest were hoboes who did not have the money to pay. Quite a lot of these fines, too, came from abandoned women.

### Arrests by Months.

The number of arrests for the year by months, were: January, 39; Feb-ruary, 40; March, 50; April, 81; May. 48; June, 45; July, 64. This shows April as being the banner month for arrests. In this month more than twice as many were gathered in by the police as during January, which month saw fewer arrests than any other of the present year.

During the month just passed, 64 arrests were made and \$295.50 taken in as fines. The largest number of fines from one source came from the women of the sporting house district. Of these, 22 paid \$7.50 each, making almost two-thirds of the amount of money received by the city from all other fines.

## What Their Crimes Were.

The next largest class of law-breakers were drunks. Seventeen were arrested on this charge. Nine were taken in for vagrancy, five for assault and battery, three for riding bicycles on the sidewalks without a for fast driving over a city bridge. and one for using profane language.
