GRAIN IS COMMENCING TO MOVE TOWARD COAST.

Since January 1 of the Present Year More Than 2,000,000 Bushels of the Golden Grain Have Been Shipped west.

The railways report some movement of wheat along their lines near this city, the principal shipments so far being those of wheat purchased by E. W. McComas near Adams and shipped to Albina for storage before being exported.

As yet there have been no ship ments from reservation points along the line of the O. R. & N., and the W & C. R. has reported but light shipments so far, but within a few weeks the roads will be taxed to their utmost capacities to handle all the wheat which will be offered for ship-

# Exports Were Enormous.

In this connection it is interesting to note that so far the shipments of wheat from the Pacific Northwest since January 1, of the present year, to South Africa alone amount to a grand total of over 2,000,000 bushels. or more than twice the total shipments of any previous year. This is occasioned in part by the superior quality of the wheat of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, and partly by the fact of the late war in South Africa having devasted the farms of that country and practically annulled the yield of wheat and other cereals.

More Than 1,000,000 Bushels Yet. In addition to the vast quantities which have already been shipped, there are now in warehouse for shipment as soon as vessels can be chartered for its handling, more than 1,-000,000 bushels which it is known will be handled this year, bringing the to-tal tonuage from Portland and Puget Sound ports to the Cape for the present year of 1902 up to 3,000,000 bushels, or three times the tonnage of any previous year.

# Much Goes to Orient,

Almost as much Pacific Northwest wheat is shipped to China and ports of the Orient every season as is being sent to South Africa this year, the great grain fields of the Big Bend country in Washington supplying the bulk of the wheat sent to China, Japan and other Eastern ports.

Added to this thousands upon thousands of bushels of wheat are ground into flour at Spokane and other inland points every year and the flaky product sent across the seas for Oriental consumption, Byers mill at Pendieton, alone sending 60,000 bestels last season.

A great wheat trade is now spring-

ing up with the Philippines and this promises within a few years to become a moving factor in the disposal of the wheat crop of the Inland Empire, though at present the trade has not reached any particularly stupendous proportions.

Russia Takes Some Also.

Russia and other Buropean countries also take a goodly amount of Pacific Northwest wheat every year, and the growing importance of this

trade to Umatilla county wheat rais ers can be estimated when it is stated that at present this county produces on an average about 1 per cent of the entire wheat crop of the United States.

### Market Rapidly Growing.

With the rapidly increasing acreage being devoted to wheat in this section it will soon be possible for wheat growers of the Inland Empire to supply a territory which consumes to South Africa From Pacific North- almost one-fifth of the grain used in the entire world and in sympathy with this wider field opened up to them the prices realized for their crops will be correspondingly increased.

# PRINCE OUROUSSOFF DEAD.

Noted Russian Diplomat Is Laid Away to Rest.

Paris, Aug. 6.-The French foreign office, as a matter of course, expressed deep regret at the death of Prince Ouroussoff, Russian ambassador to France, which occurred quite suddenly last week, but as a matter of fact the news of the taking off of the little old diplomat was received with considerable relief in official circles. time was caused by the report that the failure of the czar to pay his promised visit to the Paris exposition was entirely due to the arguments and representations of his ambassador at Paris, who in the affair acted altogether in accordance with the wishes and views of the nationalist party, that is to say, with the party most fiercely opposed to the present French government.

Although he was in the service for many years and was a favorite at the kussian court, Prince Ouroussoff never did anything superlatively brilliant in the diplomatice world. The prince was a little bit of a man and was a nephew and protege of old Prince Gortschakoff, who for so many years was chancelllor of the Russian Empire. His mother was a Princess Radziwill and his father one of the aids-de-camp of Alexander II. The late ambassador served in Bucharest and at Brussels as minister plenipotentiary, filling in between times the position of grand master of the household to Grand Duke Michael. Prince Ouroussoff left a widow, who is the daughter and heiress of old Abbaza, the Russian banker, who died as minister of finance.
