"JOE THE TURK" IS HERE

NOTED CHARACTER OF SALVATION ARMY IN TOWN.

Army Worker Who Has Been in Jail Over 40 Times for Preaching on the Streets.

Adjutant Joseph Garabed, of the Salvation Army, is now in town and is stirring things among the local corps. Adjutant Garabed is called "Joe the Turk" in Salvation circles and is a man of many and varied experiences.

He arrived in town Tuesday afternoon and in the evening was out on the streets with the rest of the members of the army here, playing a cornet and exhorting those hearing him to seek salvation. He was dressed in the regulation Turkish garb—red knickerbocker trousers, sack coat and toboggan cap, and many were heard to remark that he reminded them of the "Terrible Turk," who was through here a few weeks ago.

"Joe, the Turk" tells many hair-raising experiences which he has had since embarking in the work he is now following. He claims to have been thrown into jail more than 40 times because of preaching the gospel. His head is covered with scars claimed to have been received at the hands of the policeman when being arrested, and he has been shot at and carved many times with knives.

How He Was Converted.
Adjutant Garabed has been working in the interests of the Salvation Army for the past 18 years. Prior to that he was a resident of the toughest portion of San Francisco. He ostensibly ran a shoe shop in that section but in reality acted as receiver of stolen goods by a gang of toughs, of which he was one of the leaders. He kept this up for several years, but one day he experienced a sudden change of heart. He was watching a small band of Salvationists conducting a meeting in the street and all

REDUCTION IN WHEAT RATES

RAILWAY PRESIDENTS GRANT RELIEF TO FARMERS.

Rates on Wheat Haulage Are Cut Down 10 Per Cent All Through Inland Empire.

The conferences held on Monday and Tuesday of this week between the farmers of the Inland Empire and railway presidents Hill, Mohler and Mellen, at Davenport and Colfax, are of deep interest to the farmers of this section, inasmuch as they have resulted in a decrease of the freight rates on wheat, of which enormous quantities are shipped out of Umatilla county every season.

At these conferences the railway men are requested by the farmers to grant a reduction of the tariff on wheat from \$4.25 to \$3.50, or at least \$3.75, and while there was not so much of a reduction allowed as was asked still there was enough to cause rejoicing all over this section.

Ten Per Cent Reduction.

It is understood that a reduction of about ten per cent in wheat rates will be allowed all over the Inland Empire, which will mean a great deal to the farmers of this country as this will run to big figures when even the 3,700,000 bushels produced in this county alone are taken into consideration.

The reductions asked for by the farmers would have affected the earnings of the various roads involved to the amount of from \$500,000 to \$750,000, and the relief granted will cause a falling off of several hundred thousand dollars in the earnings of the roads from wheat haulings, though it will all be returned to the railways in the end in round-about channels.

The reduced rates will make considerable difference in the prices netted to the farmers for their wheat this fall.
