ABOUT THE BIG HORSES

ENTERTAINING ARTICLE BY CARPENTER REGARDING THEM

How the Great Shires and Other Draft Horses of England Are Raised and Cared for.

Frank G. Carpenter, in a special correspondence to the Desert News, of Salt Lake, from Liverpool, England, gives an interesting paragraph descriptive of the draft horses used in Liverpool, which is reproduced for the consideration of Eastern Oregon horse raisers.

Liverpool Horses.

The business of Liverpool can best be seen along the wharves. The enormous cargos brought here every day, are carried through the city in wagons pulled by draft horses which have not their equal anywhere. These are Clydesdales and Shire horses. They are not so heavy as the largest Percheron or Norman, but seem much stronger than either.

I have never seen such loads. A single horse will walk off with from two to five tons with apparent ease. The one-horse wagons look like billiard tables on wheels, and the two horse wagons are much larger, some weighing as much as two tons.

The ordinary load for two horses is seven or eight tons, and, with the wagon, a team sometimes carries as much as ten tons through the streets. I know these statements will be looked upon as exaggerations in the United States, but they are true.

The ordinary bale of cotton weighs 400 or 500 pounds. I saw a team carrying 30 bales as one load this morning, or from six to seven tons. The bales are piled up to the height of our hay wagon when in full load at harvest time. I saw equally large loads of merchandise, tobacco and lumber. The horses apparently had no trouble in pulling them, and walked contentedly along, directed by their drivers, who moved on foot beside them.

These Shire horses are costly. The price for the average work animal is from 50 to 100 guineas, or from \$250 to \$500. Some sell as high as 150 guineas, there being one man in Liverpool who uses horses only of this class.

The cart drivers are noted for their care of their horses. Indeed, it is said they treat them much better than they do their wives. The harness is kept shining, the skins of the animals are like satin and their manes and tails are often braided.

The hoofs are kept oiled and blacked and the legs are washed down several times daily. The horses are not pushed, and they look uniformly well. On the 1st of May, the time of the draft horse parade, the carters decorate their horses with flowers and ribbons and prizes are given to the best team.

The streets of Liverpool leading up from the docks have tracks of flagstones about a foot wide for the heavier wagons, but much of the hauling is done on streets as rough as those of New York.

Buffalo Bill's big Wild West show, which appears in Pendleton on Aug. 20, carries undoubtedly the largest number of horses and riders ever traveling with one aggregation. It is a genuine exposition of frontier horsemanship in all parts of the world. The immense arena in which the performance is given is large enough to seat several thousand people and the performance itself is given in the open air without any covering except the free sky, while the audience is shielded from sun and rain by immense canopies stretched over the seats. This is positively the only opportunity the people of this section will have of seeing the big show as it goes to Europe immediately at the conclusion of its western trip.
