Then came the American invasion. The Swift company came first, and the others followed rapidly. In almost every instance the Americans bought up the holdings of the particular commission salesman to whom they had been in the habit of consigning, paying sums ranging downward from one instance in which the purchase price was between £15,000 and £20,000.

THE WHEAT YIELD

WHILE IT IS NOT MEETING EXPECTATIONS IT IS GOOD.

Some Fields Gave Heavy Yields, While Others Were Away Down Owing to Wind Shattering Heads.

Although the wheat yield is not what was expected in Umatilla county had it not been for the wind of several weeks ago, there is little room for complaint in the east end of the county.

Many crops have been threshed in that part and while the yields are not abnormal they are almost up to the average. Again it may be said that in many years fields have harvested 40 to 50 bushels of the golden grain and in some instances more, but this is the exception and not the rule.

Following are some yields per acre from the east end which will show that many farms have yielded good crops:

Yields Per Acre.

Off 140 acres harvested by W. P. Willaby 32 bushels to the acre was the record; off 260 acres belonging to Harry Turner 6000 bushels were threshed, averaging 23 bushels; 40 acres for L. T. McBride, went 30 bushels; 50 acres of the Bradley-Hartman wheat made 25 bushels; J. M. Banister is harvesting 200 acres which is yielding 35 bushels; Henry Pinkerton's wheat yielded 30 bushels; O. C. and Otis Turner's grain is going 30 bushels; 184 acres of O. M. Richmond's threshed 32 bushels; Porter Graham had an eighty which made 40 bushels; Ad Rothrock's crop made 25 bushels and was badly shattered from the wind; John Rothrock is getting 30 bushels; Frank Curl gets 40 bushels from an eighty near Adams; James Ritchey harvested 35 bushels from his entire crop.

The most serious damage resulting from the wind in the east end was perhaps on the farm of George Badgett, north of Weston. He has just harvested 140 acres and only secured 13 bushels to the acre. Another tract of 145 acres made 25 bushels and 40 acres more made 27 bushels.

OUR BEEF IN ENGLAND.

Americans Regulate the Prices on British Tables.

Experts in the meat trade smile at the suggestion which has been made that the Americans are about to capture the English meat trade says the London Daily Mail. They say that that would be equivalent to the Dutch taking Holland; and that Smithfield market has already passed under the absolute control of American houses. The capture has been secret and gradual, but it has been none the less secure; and Chicago, through its London representative, regulates the prices of beef on London, Liverpool or Manchester tables.

Smithfield market, the center of the wholesale meat trade, consists of some 300 stalls and refrigerators, under the management of the markets committee of the city corporation. The turnover of these stalls varies from £4,000 to £50,000 each week, according to the position of the holding. There was a time, less than ten years ago, when no American held a single stall. At that time the Americans sold their meat through English salaried men in Smithfield, paying such salesmen at first 2 1/2 per cent, and afterward 2 per cent commission. It is estimated that they paid £100,000 yearly in such commissions.

AMERICAN CANOE MEET.

Paddlers of Western Hemisphere Gather at Chatham, Mass.

Chatham, Mass., Aug. 8.—The 23rd annual meeting and regatta of the American Canoe association began at Pleasant Bay today and will continue for the next two weeks. There is a good attendance, among those present being many fast paddlers from various parts of this country and Canada. Though the location of the camp is on salt water it is considered particularly well adapted for canoeing purposes, and especially convenient for the Canadians and men of the eastern division, which includes all of New England.

Last year the crack canoeists were somewhat conspicuous by their absence, but this season many of them have had a return of the old-time enthusiasm. Among the prominent paddlers here are: Paul Butler, of the Vesper Canoe club of Lowell; David Goddard, one of the old-timers; Louis B. Drake, of Winchester; Herman D. Murphy and Arthur Mather. The sailing races promise to be especially notable this year, and in the war canoe races there will be at least eight clubs, including several from the vicinity of Boston and others from Canada. The regatta program has been carefully arranged, and consists of 22 events, including all varieties of sailing and paddling, with the usual upset, hurry-scurry, club-four paddling, war canoe, and swimming events.

SCULLERS ARE HAPPY.

Big Meet of Oarsmen at Worcester, Mass., Today.

Worcester, Mass., Aug. 8.—On Lake Quinsigamond today the best amateur scullers and oarsmen in the country began their competitions in gigs and shells in the thirtieth annual championship races of the National Association of Amateur Oarsmen of America. Today was given over to the preliminaries. The chief races take place tomorrow and judging from the high class of entries many stirring races will be witnessed. The practice work of several competitors has been very good, leaving no doubt as to the probable outcome of each event. In consequence there is quite a betting interest in all the races and considerable will probably change hands. The championship seniors in particular is expected to be one of the keenest contests ever sculled in America as the entries include the three foremost oarsmen in the states, C. S. Titus, the Henley aspirant and present champion, F. Demourelli, of New Orleans, winner of the 1900 in intermediate, and "Joe" Maguire, of Cambridge, Mass., the champion of 1897.

In the international four, the intermediate eight and other of the events will be seen representative oarsmen from St. Louis, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Boston, New York, Winnipeg and other cities.
