GENERAL NEWS.

A Viking ship 49 feet long has been unearthed on the island of Karmoe, Norway.

The Colorado democratic state convention will meet in Denver September 3 and the republicans on September 4.

Lucy Hoving, chief organizer of the socialist party in Utah, was run over and instantly killed Thursday night in Ogden.

Many lives have been lost by torrential rains and floods about the Black Sea in Russia, during the past few days.

The oyster canning and packing companies of Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana have combined with a capital of \$2,000,000.

A human fossil, 35,000 years old, has been discovered in Kansas. Scientists from all over the Union are en route to examine it.

Isaac Goldsmith, once a prosperous cigar merchant of Chicago, has been arrested for selling counterfeit union labels. They brought \$35 per 1000.

An anarchistic letter has been received at Pottsville, Pa., in which the writer threatens to kill J. Pierpont Morgan in order to end the coal strike.

General Lucas Meyer, the Boer chief who has been visiting London, is in future to be excluded from the Boer councils because of his friendliness to Lord Kitchener.

The pope has notified the reigning houses of Europe that no more dispensations for consanguineous marriages will be granted. His holiness desires to prevent degeneration.

The market price of silver at Denver has jumped 3 cents during this week, and a further rise is expected as the result of a sale of 20,000,000 ounces to the Mexican government.

The head camp of the Pacific jurisdiction of Woodmen of the World, sitting in Cripple Creek, Col., has increased the salaries of head consul from \$5000 to \$6000 and the head clerk from \$2500 to \$3000.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Seven cases of smallpox are reported at Champeog, Marion county. The town may be quarantined.

The run of sockeye salmon at Whatcom, Wash., has stopped. The pack this year will be only 40 per cent of last year's pack.

Medford is to be in future a distributing center for refrigerator cars, which will be used in handling the fruit crop of that vicinity.

Harvesting is in full blast near Independence and the farmers are complaining because they cannot secure all the help necessary.

The St. Helens Light & Water Company has agreed to transfer its plant to the city for \$3000. It is believed the council will accept.

The Twenty-sixth Battery of Field Artillery will leave Vancouver, Wash., the last of the month for the annual target practice in Tillamook county.

Astoria cannerymen have reduced the price for steelheads and Chinook salmon from 4 to 2 cents per pound. Other varieties are to be priced at 1 cent.

J. Verdin, a farmer of Wilderville, in the western part of Josephine county, killed an immense brown bear in his barn lot, a few days ago. The bear boldly came into the lot and attacked the pigs. It was while in the act of killing one of the swine that the big brute was slain.

Roscoe Hughes, of La Grande, met with a peculiar accident last Thursday night. Hearing a noise in his father's barn, he went to discover the cause and fell over a pitchfork, the tines of which entered his abdomen inflicting painful, but not serious injuries.

THE INDIANS WERE NOT IN IT ON FRIDAY.

Home Boys Played Rather Loosely, While the Visitors Were Up and Coming All Through the Game.

There is no getting around the fact that the Indians were outplayed at every point Friday. The visitors played sharp, close, snappy ball, and while there was a superabundance of "ragging" at the umpire, and several bits of very unsportsmanlike work indulged in, the home boys were beaten on their merits and will have to do a little closer team work and pay a little more attention to the game if they are to win many games from the Sharpshooters.

For five innings there was nothing doing in the tally lin on either side, both the Indians and the Sharpshooters crawling out of some extremely tight places in the progress of the contest, which was a beautiful exhibition of the national game.

Trouble Started.

Then the Sharpshooters broke loose and handled "Slat's" curves without gloves until two runs were pushed over the plate in the sixth, while two bad errors in the seventh and two more in the eighth each meant run piled up by the visitors. In the ninth there was some more doing in the freeworks line and three additional runs were added to the record of the massacre.

It looked as though the Indians would be shut out until the ninth, with two men down and two on bases. Starkells pitched wild and Wilner and Hayes scored on the passed ball. The next man up hit a pop, which was gathered in and the game was over. "Slat's" Taylor's arm gave out in the seventh and Wilner was put in, but he did not turn himself loose as he should have, and was batted rather more than usual.

Good Plays Made.

There were good plays galore made on both sides, among the best being the jump catch of a hot line drive in left field by Rhea in the second, and Brown's long running catch of a high fly in center in the same inning; Wilner's double play in catching a high fly in right field and throwing home in time to cut a runner off at the plate, was the "gingeriest" play seen on the grounds in many a day and received liberal applause from the grand stand. 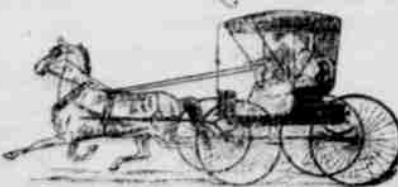
