#### BIG TREE.

Largest in the World Found in Sierras in California.

What is undoubtedly the largest known tree in the world, has recently been discovered far up in the Sierras in Fresno county, California. The monster was measured six feet from the ground and it took a line 154 feet and 7 inches long to encircle it, making it over 71 feet in diameter. This tree is on the government reserve, and will escape the woodman's axe.

#### The Telephone as a Surgical Instrument

According to a London medical journal, several London hospital surgeons are now using the telephone, whenever they have occasion to probe for bullets, or other metallic objects imbedded in the body of a person. The receiver of the telephone is placed on the head of the operator, and the patient is placed in the usual manner, in contact with a plate; the general medium employed being a wet sponge or some paper saturated with a saline solution, which is spread over the plate. The latter is connected with a telephone by wire, and the probe after it has been introduced into the body vibrates as soon as the foreign metallic substance comes in contact with it. The probe is also connected with the telephone by a wire, and thus no such blunder is possible as sometimes happens when an ordinary battery is used. When a telephone is used in this way, the plate acts as one pole and the probe as the other. Needles, bullets, grains of shot, and pieces of steel and copper have been easily located by use of this simple method. The only instances when the telephone does not work satisfactorily are when the objects to be located are of the same metal as the probe. French and German surgeons have been following these experiments in London, with the intention of introducing the same method into the hospitals of Berlin and Paris.—Scientific American.

#### MERRILL'S RIFLE.

Weapon of Dead Convict is Finally Found.

The weapon carried by Dave Merrill, the Oregon convict, from the time of his break from the penitentiary until his murder by his traveling companion, has been found after much searching, and as usual in such cases, was found by parties who had been looking but a short time.

A press dispatch from Chehalis, Wash., says that on Saturday morning Fred Runcorn and J. H. Goff went out to the scene of the killing of Dave Merrill by Harry Tracy, and after a few minutes search were so fortunate as to find the 30-30 calibre rifle which Merrill carried when Tracy killed him.

The gun was found about 200 yards from where Merrill's body was found, down the road toward Chehalis. Tracy had evidently carried the weapon that short distance and then tossed it over in the brush.

The gun was an 1894 Winchester model. It showed signs of having been out in the weather. It is on exhibition in a drug store window. Mr. Goff is a resident of Chehalis, and Mr. Runcorn formerly lived there but his home is now at Salem, Or. He is here on a visit. Mr. Runcorn is an experienced woodsman and had good luck in finding the rifle after a few minutes' hunt when others had searched for it for hours.
