THE SENATORIAL FIGHT.

(Concluded.)

"Senator Fulton's real campaign, after the legislature is in session, will be beset with troubles. He will be the objective point of attack from all sides and then elements of hidden weakness will show. His strong play will be to secure a caucus with the expectation that in such event he would secure the support of the multnomah delegation, supposed to be friendly toward him, and who, in the secrecy of a caucus, would cast a vote for whom they could not afford to assist if called upon to make an open expression of their choice. Fulton and Geer are now most talked about, yet it does not by any means imply that there will be no other candidates. In fact, there will be several and since the return of Senator Mitchell from Washington there has been unwonted activity in the interest of more than one whose desire it is to succeed Senator Simon. Friends of Binger Hermann would like to see him in the United States senate and he is known to have several close personal friends in the next legislature who would make use of every opportunity to advocate his political interest. Solomon Hirsch, ex-United States Senator McBride and H. W. Scott are also being talked about. The rumor that M. A. Moody would be a candidate is not based on fact, as he most emphatically denies the same.

Mr. Williamson Talks.

"The strongest possible man, one who will act in harmony with the majority of the present Oregon delegation at Washington, is the one who should be the choice of the next legislature for United States senator, if the wishes of the people of the whole state are to be respected," said Hon. J. N. Williamson, congressman-elect of the second district, this morning. "Oregon especially, and the whole Pacific Northwest in general, is attracting the attention of those high in power in the business and political world of the East and will continue to be before the public during the coming four years more than before. It should therefore be represented by the best that it affords in the highest branch of the government legislative body.

"Of the avowed candidates in the open, C. W. Fulton, of Astoria, and Governor Geer, the alignment of the former would seem to give him the preference if the consideration of harmony is to count for anything. Although Senator Mitchell and Congressman Tongue constitute but half of the delegation numerically, their long experience in political life, their hold on questions of interest to the public and their undisputed ability entitle them to a standing higher than they would otherwise claim as individuals, and the election of a colleague in sympathy with them on matters of interest to the state and also on national affairs would undoubtedly be an event to be desired. "As for myself being a candidate for the United States senate at the present time or near future, that is the farthest from my ambitions just now. I have no senatorial bee in my bonnet. If I can fill the position to which I have only so recently been elected to the best interests of my constituents so far as in my power to do so, I shall be satisfied."

BUSINESS MEN VICTIMIZED.

It Was the Same Old Game, But the Sharper Found "Suckers"—Will Be Wiser Next Time.

Walla Walla, Aug. 14.—A. Hooper, claiming to be a tobacco drummer, found some easy marks in this city a few days this week and consequently several business men are mourning the loss of money. Mooper came here and represented himself as being from the Continental Tobacco Company, of Chicago. For several days he solicited business, then he tried to cash drafts at the hotel for his bill, but the proprietor refused to be taken in. While here, however, he succeeded in passing two checks for \$25 each, one at the Chicago Store and the other at the store of George Kellough. Both the drafts were drawn on the Bank of Independence, Kan. The bank refused to honor them and the men are out their money. Hooper has not been arrested.

Salt Lake City, Utah, Aug. 14.—Considerable disappointment is manifested in sporting circles over the failure of the promoters to pull off the 20-round bout between Jack and George Gardner which was originally scheduled for tonight. The club is now confident of its ability to bring off the contest within the next few days, a permission to that effect having been obtained from the authorities. Both fighters are on the field and are keeping up their training so as to be in the best of condition when they are called upon to enter the ring.
