Has Been Completed and is Being Delivered Today.
C. L. Austin and E. S. Lister, two enterprising students from Eugene, came here about two months ago to put in their vacation in getting out a city directory for Pendleton. As a result they have turned out a small volume containing a list of the residents of the city and also a classified business list.
The volume also contains a number of display advertisements.
The young men have labored under disadvantages but have not let obstacles cool their ardor or weaken their enthusiasm.
While the East Oregonian does not believe that advertising pays the advertiser through such a medium, yet it would not comment adversely on the good intentions of these young men. They deserve all of the success they have attained in the matter.
The directory contains about 115 pages and the publishers claim that it is as near complete as could be made under the circumstances.
Following is its introductory about Pendleton:
Is the chief city of Eastern Oregon. Is the county seat of Umatilla. Has a population of about 6000. Is on the main line O. R. & N. Is 231 miles from Portland; 230 miles from Spokane.
Has an excellent city government by mayor and councilmen.
Has two banks and two newspapers, besides a regular monthly journal devoted to the livestock and wool industry of the Northwest.
Has a woolen mill, wool scouring mills, two flour mills, two breweries, four systems of warehouses and a foundry.
Has an excellent system of public schools, a high school, embracing a four-years' course, two academies, each with an enrollment of 200 students and also has seven churches. Is the largest producers' wool shipping point in the world. Ships 1,000,000 bushels of wheat annually.
Is also a shipping point for cattle, sheep, horses and hogs of Umatilla and Grant counties.
In all its history the city has enjoyed a steady, yet rapid growth. It is the center of a great country with unbounded resources, which will insure its continued steady growth. Every indication goes to show that Pendleton will soon be a city of 15,000 population.
Has a \$25,000 hospital under construction and an excellent academy building in project.
Has a business college.
Has an electric car service in view.
Has three lumber yards and a sash and door factory and planing mill.
Is a home building city and has many splendid business men.
Has a good water supply.
Has a good electric light service.
Has a good sewerage system.
Has eight passenger trains a day and also three stage lines.
Has about 100 places of business. Has about 90 professional men and women.

A BUILDING TRAIN.

A New Feature in Railroad Construction.
Chicago, Ill., Aug. 15.—The departure today of the government good roads train marks the inauguration of a project that is expected to be of immense benefit to the entire Northwest. The train consists of a dozen flat cars loaded with the most improved road machinery, and two cars with dining and sleeping rooms attached for the accommodation of a party of engineers, road experts and representatives of the United States department of agriculture.
The train will reach Minneapolis early in September, where demonstrations of theoretical and practical road making will be given at the state fair grounds during fair week. At the close of the fair the train will continue westward to the Pacific Coast, stopping at principal cities enroute at each of which practical demonstrations in good road building will be given. The chief aim will be to show what can be done with such road material as can be found in the various cities to be visited, introducing practical road machinery and the most approved methods of road construction. This travelling school, it is believed, will result in great benefit to the Northwestern states, where practical instruction in road building is much needed. The trip will occupy 100 days and will be under the general direction of Martin Dodge, director of public road inquiries of the United States department of agriculture.
