GOOD ROADS MOVEMENT.
"Straw Day" in Walla Walla County Set for Labor Day—Elaborate Preparations.
To the Promoter of the Good Roads Movement:
The people of Walla Walla county are convinced that their commercial and moral well-being will be greatly promoted by the acquisition of permanent good roads. Acting upon this conviction, a committee of citizens in conjunction with the board of county commissioners have perfected an organization for the due observance of the second annual "Straw Day" in Walla Walla county.
The plan adopted for this occasion is briefly as follows:
Monday, September 1, 1902, being Labor day, has been chosen as "Straw day."

Every road supervisor in the county is chief of the strawing force in his district, and has the right to name three "strawing captains" as his assistants to co-operate with him in strawing the roads in his district.
It is expected that the public spirited farmers will donate the straw and teams to put the straw on the roads, so that no expense will be incurred for this purpose by the county or committee.
All the districts in this county will be strawed on the forenoon of Straw day; but districts are allowed the right to select any day they may choose for strawing, and will receive credit for such strawing when reports of work done are turned in to the committee on Straw day. It is expected that at least 300 miles of the roads of Walla Walla county will be strawed as the result of this organized movement.

On the afternoon of Straw day a public celebration and old-fashioned barbecue will be held at Baumeister's grove, near Walla Walla city, at which time two oxen will be barbecued, mutton and other meats roasted, and the multitudes fed. A literary program will be provided, with able speakers to treat subjects germane to the movement, and the Walla Walla Military band will furnish the music. All organized labor societies are invited to participate, and will be presented on this program, and in the day's festivities.

The Walla Walla committee earnestly recommends to all counties in Washington and Oregon, interested in good roads, to set on foot the movement to better the roads of their respective counties, and hold a celebration in commemoration thereof. The committee also invites all who can be present to attend at Walla Walla on Straw day, and contribute to the success of that day.

A large number of prizes have been donated by our enterprising merchants and citizens, and will be awarded in the competition for work done on the public roads.
The committee requests all newspapers receiving this circular to publish the same for the information of their people and readers.

"The United States government system of leasing in the Cascade reserve has proven satisfactory and a general benefit to all in the way of preservation of timber and division of grazing territory between cattle and sheep men will be the result of the opening of the new reserve.
"As it is now, we are overrun with sheep men who pass our way from Wasco, Sherman and parts of Gilliam and Grant counties on the way to the mountains. As affairs are run now, it takes about four sections of land to pasture a flock three months during the summer, and if a man has to be continually paying rent for pasturing the year around he might as well go out of business.
"Still, there is money in sheep. One prominent sheepman, Charley Cartwright, came to Crook county 20 years ago broke, and now, by thrift, energy and foresight, has accumulated one of the best ranches, fully stocked, in the country, worth \$50,000 to \$75,000."—Oregon Daily Journal.
