PLAYING TO THE GALLERIES.

The actor who overdoes his part in the play, or makes a special exhibition of himself instead of interpreting the character he represents, is charged with playing to the galleries. It sometimes costs an actor his position to play to the galleries. He may make a great hit with the "Gallery Gods," while he is playing to them, but it is not the kind of work the manager wants, and the man who plays to the galleries is soon let out. But the actor is not the only person who plays to the galleries, and he is not the only one to suffer from playing to the galleries. It is a popular fad with most all men and women and they begin it early. The smallest tot plays to the galleries. It is a sort of inborn nature to play to the galleries. Mankind likes to be noticed. It likes to be "IT." It likes to hear itself applauded. It would rather have applause that is obtained by faking than to have no applause at all.

It is confined to no one class. The professions and trades, and all callings seek it. The lawyer, in addressing the jury, exerts himself until his face turns red, he beats on the table, and imagines he is moving the audience to tears, and all of those kind of things, not entirely for the good of his client, but with a spirit of "just look at me," expecting the "galleries" to see in him another Daniel Webster. The physician seizes his medical case, jumps into his buggy at a break-neck speed and drives away, lashing his horses, not thinking any more of his patient's welfare than he does of attracting the public attention. The professor wears his hair long, not because it is comfortable to wear it in that way, but he expects the public to remark, "There goes a learned man." The high-salaried minister parades behind his flower-laden pulpit, casts his eyes to the ceiling, pours forth deep guttural words, and besides the thought of saving souls, he is as anxious for people to "look" as well as hear.

Of course, they are not all that way, but in all of the trades and professions and callings, the spirit of playing to the galleries is manifest. Even the newspaper man feels his superiority, and would feel disappointed should he be told that his editorial which he expected to move the community was sheer rot.

The cost of playing to the galleries is great. Many expend more than their income in trying to appear above their actual condition. While they know their actual condition and worth, they would like for the "galleries" to place a higher estimate upon them.

It is legitimate to have a high estimate of one's self, but when the estimate is placed too high it becomes dangerous to one's welfare. Ambition is always valuable when it runs in the right channel, but when it runs astray it is one of the most damaging elements in human nature. When people learn to smother that pride or ambition which ever prompts them in playing to the galleries and appearing to be what they are not, and are content with realism instead of idealism, the world will be much better off.

U. S. TOPOGRAPHIC MAPPING.

According to the assignment of work for the present season, recently announced by the Director of the United States Geological Survey, the topographic branch will this summer have 70 surveying parties in the field. These parties will be engaged in conducting surveys and securing the necessary data for maps of different sections of 33 states and territories. When, at the close of the field season, this material is worked up and placed in the hands of the printer, it will be embodied in about 100 topographic map sheets, which will represent approximately 32,000 square miles of country, an area nearly as large as that of New England without the state of Maine.

The surveys are made with great care and the resulting maps are models of the cartographer's art in beauty of finish and precision and accuracy of detail; their extreme cheapness also recommends them for widespread use. The standard size of the maps issued by the Geological Survey is a sheet 16 1/2 by 20 inches, covering an area of 15 minutes, 30 minutes, or one degree in extent each way, depending on the scale employed. One of the interesting and useful features of these maps is their expression of the relief or contour of the surface. To accomplish this lines are drawn through points of equal elevation at regular intervals of 10, 20, 50 or 100 feet, according as the country is flat or rugged in character, and from these lines, known as "contours," it is possible, by noting whether they lie near together or distant on the map, to clearly read the shapes and slopes of the hills, the extent of the valleys, and their altitudes above the sea level. This feature greatly adds to their value for engineers, tourists, and others to whom an accurate knowledge of the topography is of importance.

For the convenience of those desiring detailed information regarding its map publications the Geological Survey distributes, on application, small index sheets or folders for the different states, which show, by a system of small rectangles stamped on a key map, the exact territory surveyed and mapped in each, and

also the scale of miles, the names, areas, manner of purchase, and other facts of interest connected with the published maps.
