GENERAL NEWS.

Colonel Hemphill, the famous rebel general, died at Atlanta yesterday.

Mexican outlaws killed two policemen against whom their pal had a grudge.

South African soldiers are making application by the score to join the American army.

The pope of Rome has disregarded his physician's advice and now feels better in health for doing so.

Gompers opposes the New York unions having anything to do with the proposed political movement.

One regiment of soldiers protecting the operators in the coal strike, is composed entirely of union miners.

Lincoln, Neb., experienced her hottest day during the season yesterday. The thermometer went away above the 100 mark.

Frohman, the veteran manager, has returned from Europe and announces his program in the dramatical line for the coming season.

While boys were fishing off the wharf in New York, one accidentally struck the other on the head with a heavy lead sinker with fatal results.

The Antarctic exploring expedition is progressing slowly. It is imprisoned in the ice, but expects to sail for the south pole as soon as the thaw sets in.

Bessie Mills, of Forest Grove, aged 15 years, is reported to have fallen into a stream near that place and remained under water 15 minutes before she was rescued, but by the good work of women who undertook to resuscitate her, she was brought to life and now lives to tell the story.

A donkey engine weighing 10 tons has been received by the I. R. & N. branch of the O. R. & N., at Nahcotta, Wash., near the mouth of the Columbia, to be used in logging from that section. The engine is claimed to be the largest ever introduced into the logging industry in that section.

Kanter, a member of the posse that captured Tracy and who was first to reach the dead outlaw's body and take his revolver from his hand, has petitioned Governor Geer to order the sheriff, who afterwards turned up on the scene and took the revolver from him, to turn the revolver over to him, as he desires to keep it as a souvenir of the capture. It is said that the governor will probably grant the request.

WANTS MORE HOUSES.

Newcomer Says Business Men are Turned Away From Pendleton.

Editor East Oregonian:—I have scarcely been in Pendleton a sufficient length of time to entitle me to criticize without appearing to be somewhat fresh or immodest, but there is one thing in which some of your people are perplexingly slow, and that is in not furnishing business houses and residences equal to the demand. To my personal knowledge there have been in the past two weeks four men here searching for suitable establishments. Neither of them have been successful, and as a matter of course, they are forced to go somewhere else. This is bad, and works an injury to your town.

The geographical position of Pendleton, strengthened by her vast and bountiful resources, insures her to always be a good and prosperous town, but if she is to keep pace with the spirit of progress, and to become a commercial city of prominence and influence, homes must be supplied to those who would come here and reside; and suitable business houses must be found for men who are willing to come and invest their money.

Every man who has sufficient means to launch a business enterprise, or start in the mercantile business, has an influence with many others who will follow him and locate either in the city or country; and his friends will follow always in their "wake." It is through this influence that small towns have been converted into prosperous and pretentious cities in an exceedingly short length of time. If Pendleton property owners force capitalists and business men to leave the city because of their inability to supply them with suitable quarters, they must not expect the "geographical position" and "vast resources" are going to convert even a healthy town into a bustling city.

STORAGE RESERVOIRS IN WEST.

Past Season Has Demonstrated the Necessity for Government Aid.

A significant indication of the agricultural progress of the West is the growth of public opinion toward the fullest possible use of the streams for irrigation, and especially toward the conservation of the winter and spring flood waters which now run to waste. A recent report received by the United States Geological Survey, in its study of the country's water resources, from Mr. A. L. Fellows, resident hydrographer of the Survey for the state of Colorado, throws interesting light upon the water situation now existing in that state.

The urgent necessity for storage of water, says Mr. Fellows, was never more fully demonstrated than by the great scarcity of water in Colorado during the present irrigation season. The gagings of the streams by the United States Geological Survey show lower stages than have ever been known before at the same season, and

the fact that a winter flow of considerable magnitude, although less than the normal, might have been stored if reservoirs had been available, and the further fact that a number of floods of short duration, resulting from violent rain storms, were left unutilized, have opened the eyes of the irrigators as never before to the necessity for storage. Although the shortage has been most marked upon the eastern slope of the Rockies the same is true to a less extent upon the western slope. Whereas in the eastern streams there has been practically no high stage, water being taken in the irrigation ditches before any high stage could be observed in the streams, on the western slopes the streams, while reaching a stage considerable run-off, have nevertheless attained their maxima at early periods, and have subsided quickly, so that low-water stages have come from one to two months earlier than usual.

These facts, taken in connection with the prevalent high charges for water and the increasing value of land susceptible of irrigation, have resulted in filings being made upon a great many reservoir sites throughout the state.
