# A STRAIGHT STORY

## OF CHASE OF DOUBLE SET OF OUTLAWS.

How Deputy Ritchie Was Shot and How Sheriff Taylor and Posse Caught the Trail of the Robbers They Were Not Pursuing, But Made a Good Haul.

The man hunt through Umatilla county has resembled in many ways the famous struggle by the officials to capture the late outlaw Tracy, and there was no little excitement in the east end of the county.

### Freewater Hold-up.

Last Thursday night two masked and armed men entered Key's saloon, in Freewater and left with about \$150 which they took at the point of pistols from the unwilling bartender and five other men in the barroom at the time. They backed out of the saloon and disappeared. A description of the hold-ups was given the officers, and a chase was immediately instituted. Deputy Ritchie, of Athena, located two men supposed to be the men who did the robbing, and securing the services of two other men, they proceeded to the house where they had heard the outlaws were located.

### Gun Failed.

When they arrived at the place, which is a few miles from Athena, the two men accompanying the deputy were placed in position to command all places of escape. This was Saturday afternoon. After placing his men Ritchie started to make a stalk on the building. When within several yards the door suddenly flew open and a fusillade of bullets was sent toward the officer. He undertook to use his gun and it was found to be out of order and would not work.

### Deputy's Friends Skulked.

In the fight Ritchie was hit in the fleshy part of the leg and the other two men left the scene without rendering any assistance to the officer.

When Ritchie was hit he fell partly behind some object which served, perhaps, in saving his life. The two bad men, then thinking they had killed the officer, mounted his horse and rode away.

### Taylor on the Trail.

Sheriff Taylor, receiving a telephone message of the facts, immediately went to the scene of operations and a posse was also organized at Walla Walla which hastened to the scene. Taylor was accompanied by Boone Watson and D. Turner, both good men with guns, and men whom he could trust. Arriving at the scene of the fight, they took the supposed trail of the outlaws. Saturday night and all day Sunday the chase was kept up with vigilance, but no sign of the robbers was found although the officers thought they were on the right trail.

### A New Crime.

Sunday evening Sheriff Taylor and his posse went to Touchet station, and stopping at a farm house near by, were preparing for dinner when a man was heard hallowing at the station, a quarter of a mile away. Nothing was thought of the occurrence until a man came running over to the house where the officers were and told them a Swede had been held up and almost beaten to death by two thugs.

### Running Fight.

The officers saddled their horses and started in pursuit of the two men, thinking they were the same fellows wanted for the robbery of the saloon at Freewater. They followed them about a mile and a half when the robbers were discovered in the brush along the railroad track and a lively fusillade of shots was engaged in between the officers and robbers. The robbers dashed into the underbrush along the creek and, it being dark by this time it was impossible to track them further.

### Easy Arrests.

The chase was then given up until Monday morning, when it was again taken up, but no further trace could be found of them until Tuesday forenoon, when one of the men was found in a wheat field near Athena, where he had engaged to work in harvest. He submitted to arrest without resistance. The officers then instituted a search for the other outlaw and soon located him working in another harvest field. He also submitted to arrest without trouble and the two were turned over to the Walla Walla sheriff, the crime of robbing the Swede having been committed in the State of Washington.

### Had Not Caught Right Men.

Until the time of the capture of these two men the posse thought it was on the trail of Coffey and his pal, wanted for the robbery of Key's saloon and the shooting of Deputy Ritchie, but it was found that the two men captured were not concerned with Coffey and his pal, but were working independently.

The officers are now at sea as to the whereabouts of the Freewater hold-ups.

### Coffey Will be Caught.

Sheriff Taylor, who returned from

the chase of the would-be followers of the late Tracy last night, said that it was only a question of time until Coffey and his pal will be caught. The meshes are so interwoven about them that escape is practically impossible. Their capture may be expected any day.
