

CULINARY CONCEITS.

Eggs will cook much more evenly if the frying pan is covered.

Turnips should always be cooked slowly in salted water. Fast boiling makes them tough and strong. Before putting on milk to boll rinse out the saucepan with water. This

will prevent the milk burning. In cooking kidneys do not use a fork for turning them; simply toss or shake them in a pan. By this method the gravy will be retained. In broiling meats never allow them to smoke. After the coals have burned down somewhat throw on a handful of

salt to deaden the blue flame that In serving fish steaks they may be attractively arranged on a platter around a mound of mashed potatoes beaten light. On the top of the mound set a lemon basket filled with parsley. Veal should always have a sliced onion and a sliced carrot cooked with it,

whether roasted or boiled, and a little butter added just before serving. The carrot and onion give a peculiarly delicious flavor to the rather tasteless meat.

To Reclaim Wornout Lands.

If you think that lands lack humus, apply stable manure or turn under a green crop. The best general green crop is red clover, but it does not catch well on very sandy and very hard solls. Then begin with any crop which will grow-rye, buckwheat, corn, beans, anything to get a start. If the land produces weeds when left to itself, it is good enough to produce something else. Turn the weeds under, sow something, turn it under, sow again. In two or three years the results will be seen, remarks a writer on this subject.

Potatoes Planted Early and Sprayed.

Many farmers plant potatoes late in the season in order to avoid in part the ravages of the potato bug, and there is no question about there being some advantage in this respect. But if continued experiments demonstrate that early planting and thorough spraying will increase the crop from fifty to a hundred bushels per acre over late planting and little or no spraying it would seem a wise policy to plant early and protect the plants by spraying, says Professor L. A. Clinton of New York.
