GENERAL NEWS.

San Francisco box-makers are out on a strike.

A serious race war is in progress at Tupelo, Miss.

The new White Star liner, Cedric, will carry 5000 passengers.

It is doubtful if any attempt will be made to float the proposed Cuban loan for several months.

Rumors of the killing of English missionaries in the Hunan province of China are very persistent.

Good rains are reported in India, bringing crops along to fruition and averting the threatened famine.

The name of the successor of James Cambon, French ambassador to the United States, has not yet been made public.

Only seven delegates were present when the "middle-of-the-road" populist convention was called to order at Topeka, Kan.

The last of the horse cars has disappeared from the streets of Berlin, Germany, this method of transportation having been displaced by electricity.

It is reported that J. Pierpont Morgan is planning to establish a fund for the maintenance of a number of scholarships similar to those established by the late Cecil Rhodes.

Five men and a woman were taken into custody by the New York police Thursday on a charge of having worked a "green goods" game. This is said to be the biggest haul of this kind in months.

Andrew Carnegie has made an offer of \$25,000 to Dawson City, Yukon Territory, for the establishment of a free library. The usual conditions in such endowments are stipulated.

Cuba has introduced a clause in her tariff sheet which admits cheese cloth to the island free of cost, this being done on account of the extensive use of the cloth in covering tobacco plants while in course of propagation.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Commencing with September, the United States weather office at Portland will issue a monthly forecast of the weather.

The Iowa Lumber Company has purchased 1500 acres of timber lands near Medford and will establish a big saw mill there.

Sarah Donaldson has recovered \$35 damages in a Portland court on account of injuries inflicted upon her by a savage cow.

Colonel Emmet Callahan, of Baker City, has accepted an invitation to deliver the address at the La Grande Labor day celebration.

Portland business men are agitating the establishment of a new steamship line to operate between that port and Nome, Alaska.

The president of a company which is to establish a condensed milk factory at Forest Grove, is now in the east purchasing machinery for the plant.

Latest reports from Lane county are to the effect that the great swarms of grasshoppers which have made their appearance in that and adjoining counties are doing no injury to crops.

Governor Gear has been requested by the claimants of the reward for the capture and return of Harry Tracy, to place the reward money in the hands of some Washington court, where a suit can determine to whom it shall be paid.

Union county Thursday made a payment of \$4097.78 which was due the state as eight years' interest on that county's delinquent state taxes for 1893. A partial payment of \$287.22 was made on account of interest due on the delinquent taxes of 1893.
