REAL ESTATE SALES

DEALERS REPORT BETTER MOVEMENT THAN LAST YEAR.

While Not Many Sales are Being Made at Present There are Numerous Inquiries and Marked Improvement is Looked For.

Despite the fact that August is the most quiet month of the year for real estate sales the land dealers of this city report a very good business and almost universally say that real estate is more active at present than it was at this time last year, although it is still very quiet.

All, however, are unanimous in predicting a strong turn for the better in the immediate future and the majority say that the first signs of improvement have already appeared in the numerous calls for property of all kinds which are coming in almost every day.

Several of the real estate men are out of the city, enjoying their summer vacation at present, but those who are in town were seen by an East Oregonian representative and all talked encouragingly of the outlook for this city and vicinity in the coming few months.

Wade is Busy.

"Just at present," said E. T. Wade, "everyone is busy with harvest, or something which takes his mind away from real estate deals, yet I have no cause to complain of the status of business. I believe things in my line are much better than at this time a year ago and look for a great improvement within a few weeks. As soon as the farmers finish harvesting their crops a number of them will be looking for places in town, and this year a good many will purchase instead of renting as they have been doing in former years."

"Already I am getting numerous inquiries for city property and have within the past week or so made several first-class deals, one of which is the best I have closed this year, but as yet they are not in such shape that I can give out particulars."

"Another thing which will tend to improve the tone of the real estate market is the fact that many people in this city who have been renting property have decided to remain here permanently and will be looking for homes this fall. You can say that business is good and I look for great improvement."

Boyd Looks For Improvement.

"Business is rather quiet just at present," said Col. E. D. Boyd, "but I look for considerable movement in the next few weeks, as soon as farmers finish harvesting and market their crops."

"If the prices realized for wheat are as good as expected the farmers will have considerable surplus money to invest and much of this will go into real estate. Loans on country security which are being freely made at present will be paid off as soon as the crop is marketed and the money thus returned to capitalists will naturally seek investment in new channels, and real estate at present offers one of the most certain to be found."

"I think there will be a lively movement in this line very shortly."

Everything Lovely With Earnheart.

When seen at his office in the Association block W. F. Earnheart was all smiles and said that while business was not as brisk as he could handle without working overtime, still it was good and he had many inquiries regarding property both city and country, several sales being now on the tapis with good chances of being closed within a short time.

"While business is rather light just at present," said he, "I have no complaint to make and feel confident that times will be lively in my line within a few weeks. There are many farmers who will have money to invest in city property this fall, a number who have been renting are now in the market to purchase ranches of their own, and there are many new arrivals from the East who are looking for both city and country property."

"Hardly a day passes that I have not some one who has just arrived from the East asking regarding farm lands, and I also find a good demand for residence property in town among the home seekers who are coming in."

"The placing on the market of the unsold portion of the Umatilla reservation is having a beneficial effect on the real estate market as large numbers of people are coming from outside points in search of lands on the reserve and many of those who come for this purpose will be unable to secure what they want on the reservation lands, but will find something else which will suit them and will make purchases of both city and country property."

"Within the past year there has been no boom of any kind, but there has been noticeable a constant improvement in the city and the real estate market is as good or better now as at any time for months past with safe assurance of a substantial improvement in the immediate future."

New Hotel at Hot Lake.

Ground was broken this week for a new hotel to be erected at Hot

Lake, four miles from Union, to cost about \$25,000. The present facilities are entirely inadequate to meet the demands at that great resort, and this big structure will supply the need. This means that Hot Lake is destined to become one of the great health resorts of the country.—Union Republican.

THE SARTORIS WEDDING.

Granddaughter of Gen. U. S. Grant Was Married in Canada Today.

Cobourg, Ont., Aug. 23.—A number of distinguished Americans witnessed the marriage today of Miss Vivian Sartoris, eldest daughter of Mrs. Nellie Grant Sartoris and granddaughter of Gen. U. S. Grant, and Mr. Frederick Roosevelt Scovel. The ceremony was performed in St. Peter's Church, which was prettily decorated with palms and white roses. A wedding reception followed the ceremony at the home of the bride's grandmother, Mrs. U. S. Grant. Mr. and Mrs. Scovel left for a honeymoon trip.

Announcement Caused Surprise.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 23.—The announcement last week of the engagement of Miss Vivian Sartoris, whose marriage to Mr. Frederick Roosevelt Scovel took place today at Cobourg, Ont., was received with considerable surprise by her many friends in this city. She was reported engaged twice before, once to Archibald Balfour, a cousin of the English premier, and again to Timothy Nichols, a rich New York club man.

The bride of today was born in London 22 years ago and made her social debut in 1896 at a large reception given at Mrs. Grant's home in this city. She is a pretty brunette, with chestnut hair and a rich olive complexion. She is of medium height with a tendency to plumpness. She was educated abroad under the personal supervision of her mother.

Mr. Scovel is a son of Chevalier and Mme. Edward Scovel, cousin of President Roosevelt, and nephew of Frederick Roosevelt of New York, and of Mme. Ricardo Diaz Albertini, of Cobourg.

WANT PHILADELPHIA PROPERTY.

Suit to be Commenced Over Valuable Real Estate in Heart of City.

Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 23.—During the coming week several score of persons living in various parts of Indiana and adjoining states will meet in Indianapolis to raise funds to send legal representatives to Philadelphia to establish their claim to property in the business district of that city, valued at millions of dollars, which they claim is due them as descendants of Daniel Pegg, the original owner of the land.

The heirs claim that Pegg owned 350 acres of land in what is now the heart of Philadelphia, an a land-grant from the lieutenant governor of the colony of New York, which was later confirmed by letters-patent from the first governor of Pennsylvania, William Penn. The heirs believe that they can prove title to the ground, which it is declared was leased to the city of Philadelphia by Daniel Pegg, the third of the line. They have engaged able counsel to represent them and go to Philadelphia to search the records for the proofs.

In order to prove the claim it will first be necessary to secure a plat of the ground, a very difficult thing, the attorneys say, and if the proof is obtainable, suit will be filed to recover the property and moneys due them for rental on the lease. The claimants have two or three times before attempted to investigate the claim, but have never had sufficient funds. It is believed that at next week's conference a sufficient amount will be raised to push the matter to a conclusion.

PRINEVILLE STOCK SHOW.

Local Stockmen Will Attempt One This Fall.

Tuesday night a number of the local stockmen and others held a meeting to determine whether there would be a stock show and fair held here this fall or not. The general opinion was that there would be no races, but that there would be a strong effort made to hold a stock show and agricultural fair at some time in the future that would be the most convenient for all concerned. There is considerable interest being manifested by the stockmen of the county in such a show. The idea of fall races was given up as not being practicable at this time.—Crook County Journal.

FINE BRED SHEEP.

Baldwin Sheep & Land Co. Receive Imported Stock.

J. P. Van Houten, accompanied by E. H. Dean, arrived in Shaniko from the East, where he had gone to receive some fine sheep for the Baldwin Sheep & Land Co. Eight of these sheep are French merinos, direct from France, two rams being from Gilbert, and one ram and five ewes from Sirreau, both celebrated breeders of fine merinos. Along with these French merinos were 20 rams and 75 ewes, the pick from the best flocks of Spanish merinos in Ohio.—Shaniko Leader.
