Newport, R. I., Aug. 23.—Newport society is on edge in anticipation of the theatricals to be given by Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt at Beaulieu tonight. From all indications it will be the most notable function Newport has witnessed this season. The number of guests will be within 400. They will include married couples, who are of the dancing set, all the beaux and the older set of girls. A large part of the lawn has been converted into an open-air theater with regular stage, settings and auditorium. The entertainment will be provided by the "Wild Rose" company, which came here from New York yesterday. It is the first time on record that a metropolitan theater has been closed for a night to allow the company to appear in private, and it was only by the expenditure of something like \$5000 that this was accomplished by the ambitious young society leader. Following the performance of the "Wild Rose," the guests will enter the ball room at Beaulieu, where the cotillion will be led by Elisha Dyer and Mrs. Vanderbilt. After the cotillion there will be a supper. The resources of the Vanderbilt establishment will be in evidence in the number of liveried flunkies standing in imposing lines. The livery is black satin knee breeches, black silk stockings and claret coats with froggings.

## FARMERS' TRUST.

South Dakota Agriculturalists are Affected a Big Combine.

Pierre, S. D., Aug. 23.—Details concerning the farmers' trust, which has been incorporated here with a capital of \$50,000,000, are just being made public. Under the plan of the concern no one but farmers will be allowed to own a share of stock. Branch offices are to be established all over the United States, the chief branch establishment to be in Chicago.

All kinds of farm products are to be dealt in and handled on a commission basis or for cash, as circumstances may direct. Deals on the Chicago Board of Trade in cash grain are also contemplated, with the object of giving the farmer a chance of getting a better price for his product and at the same time shutting out the middleman.

It is believed that by eliminating the middleman, and having the farmers of the country behind it, the organization can maintain a uniform price to the benefit of the farmer without injury to the consumer.

## Kansas Fusionists on Warpath.

Topeka, Kas., Aug. 23.—The fusionists of Kansas opened their state campaign with a monster rally in Topeka today. The affair was in the nature of a big outing and it attracted politicians and other visitors from many parts of the state. There was a parade in the forenoon and after luncheon followed a big open-air mass meeting with addresses by Mayor Craddock, candidate for governor, Mayor Reed of Kansas City, Mo., and other prominent political leaders. In the auditorium this evening the rally closes with more speeches.
