CHANCE FOR RIDERS.

Belt Valued at \$100 Will Be Given at Baker Street Fair to Best "Broncho Buster."

"We will give a handsome belt valued at fully \$100, for the best broncho buster during the street fair and carnival next month," articulated Secretary Will Levens this morning. "The feats will be performed at the ball park during the festa and money prizes will also be awarded."

Secretary Levens said the belt was for the champion of the state and other premiums would be hung up for less fortunate ones. In this manner it is hoped to induce wild horse riders from all cattle and horse centers in the webfoot domain to enter the contests.

A meeting of the executive committee will be held this week and an apportionment made of funds collected for the enterprise. President Hoiser is absent but will be in the city Tuesday. From that time forward there will be a constant hum in the carnival sphere. One of the main departments to receive immediate attention will be that of stock and agriculture.—Baker City Herald.

OREGON DAILY JOURNAL CUP.

Frazier Is Now Third in Race, But He Is A-coming.

There is a pretty race on between three prominent Oregon Elks for the Oregon Daily Journal loving cup, to be given away the 13th of September. Two days ago B. B. Rich, of Portland, was in the lead with George E. Streeter, of the same place, a close second and Frank Frazier, of Pendleton, coming close behind him. Today the vote has switched and Streeter is again ahead. He now has 19,802 votes and Rich has 19,277, while Frazier only has 10,800.

From this it is seen that the winning of the Journal loving cup lies with the man whose friends put up the hardest fight.

Frazier was in the lead a while and now it is first Streeter and then Rich. The friends of Frazier have not been making much of a demonstration of late, but it is expected that they will do something between now and the time for the closing of the contest, which is the 13th of September. Frazier is one of the most popular men of Eastern Oregon and stands high among the Elks. If he does not win the cup and bring it to Pendleton he will be a close second when the last votes are counted.

JACK BROWN "BLACKLISTED."

Drunk Again Last Night and Fined \$10 This Morning.
Jack Brown has been figuring in police court again. He had just finished serving a five days' sentence in the city jail for being drunk and disorderly and last night he loaded up again and proceeded to make a nuisance of himself until he was thrown back into jail. This morning when taken before Police Judge McCourt Jack pleaded guilty and was fined \$10.

In view of the fact that it does him no good to be fined or to serve a term in jail, Brown has now been placed on the "blacklist" and any one furnishing him anything to drink hereafter will be liable to a fine. Jack is a good fellow when sober, but when he gets too much drink he gets noisy and the police have to throw him in. It is the hope of the police by blacklisting him to be able to keep liquor away from him for a while, at least, and keep him sober. He has a ravenous thirst for drink and cannot leave it alone.

New Corner Stone.

Monterastelli Brothers have just finished dressing and cutting the corner stone for the new Christian Church being erected at Athena. The stone is of Vermont grey granite and on the side that faces the streets are the words: "Church of Christ, 1902." An old stone was also sent down which has been used at the old church with the figures "1893" thereon, and had "1902" added on it. It will be placed in the wall of the new building.

TRAIN WRECK.

Tramps Buried in the Debris to a Large Number.

Danville, Ill., Aug. 30.—The east-bound freight on the Big Four road, was wrecked near here this afternoon. Several tramps were buried in the wreckage. Three bodies have been recovered. It is believed that four others were killed.

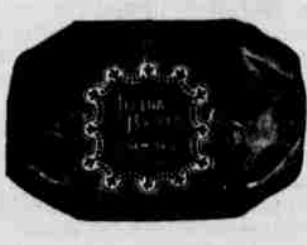
Reward Offered.
