GENERAL NEWS.

General Anghuere refuses to give up the presidency of the states of Maracalbo, Venezuela, and complications are feared.

The czar of Russia has proposed to reduce the standing armies of Europe and use the money thus saved toward fighting the trusts.

Soldiers of the national guard stationed at Parkersburg joined with the striking miners to induce non-union men to quit work at the mines.

New York Yachtsmen are thinking of building a challenger for the Columbia in view of the fact that none of the foreign yachts have been able to approach her in speed.

One, James J. VanAllen, of Newport, having acquired his millions in America, is planning to dispose of all his property in the United States and move to England, which he says, "is the only fit place for a gentleman to live in."

Forty thousand men, representing 40 different callings, are on a strike at Florence, Italy. Troops have been called out and numerous arrests have been made. It is feared that the strike will spread to the other industrial centers.

A flying spark from a passing engine started a fire at Butte, Mont., which resulted in the destruction of the entire hoisting plant, pumping station and shaft house of the Alice Consolidated Gold & Silver Mining Company, at a loss of \$100,000.

Notwithstanding the fact that Turkey has shut off all discussion on the subject of the Miss Stone ransom money, the United States will not have it that way and insists that Turkey is responsible, on the ground that the capture, release, payment of ransom money, all, took place on Turkish soil.

John Barrett, commissioner general of the St. Louis Exposition, was granted an audience by the emperor and empress dowager of China. China will send an imperial commissioner and a display to the fair. In violation of all precedent, Mr. Barrett and Minister Conger were granted a personal interview upon the throne dias and accorded striking honors.

Eight out of the ten cargoes of wheat and flour that left Oregon and Washington ports the past 60 days have been to African points.

The site contest for the world's fair at Portland has narrowed down to a fight between Willamette Heights and Hawthorne Park.

The annual report of State Superintendent Ackerman shows an increase in the number of school voters in Oregon from 63,000 in 1891, to 85,146 at the present time.

The colleges of the Inland Empire are preparing for a brisk season on the gridiron this year and there is much speculation as to which will come out victor in the three-cornered fight between Whitman college, Washington Agricultural college and the University of Idaho.

The alarm is raised in a number of interior Eastern Oregon counties that the shortness in the native range is going to give sheepmen trouble there this winter. The method of passing through the winter on the cheapest and best plan is the problem that is agitating them. A severe winter will cause a great loss to the stockmen as feed will necessarily be very high at many points.

THAT BAKER CITY RIOT

Did Not Occur at the Mining Town, But Took Place in Malheur County.

A special dispatch received yesterday by the Democrat announced that the Chinese government has called upon the state department at Washington for reparation of the outrages committed on Chinese near Baker City August 8th.

The action complained of by the Chinese government was the occurrence in Mormon Basin, Malheur county, about the 8th of the month, in which a lot of masked robbers, supposed to be men who live in that vicinity, entered the placer digging camp of a lot of Chinamen, set fire to their shacks, 21 of which were burned rounded up the Chinamen in a body, held them up and robbed them of all their treasure. This camp is about 50 miles southeast of Baker City and has been and is a good gold producer.

A short time ago, complaint was made by the owners of the China store near the camp where the outrage occurred, to the District Attorney, Sam White. A short investigation of the matter showed that it was out of his district entirely and Mr. White then called upon the sheriff of Malheur county by telephone and requested him to investigate the occurrence, suggesting at the same time that there would undoubtedly be complaint lodged by the Chinese government to the United States government, and damages demanded for the outrages committed.
