The European wheat crop is estimated to give an increase of 193,120,000 bushels over the crop of 1901; a decrease of 136,320 bushels is expected in the European corn crop. The wheat crop of the United States is estimated at 646,100,000 bushels, with a surplus of 210,160,000 bushels. The Canadian wheat crop is estimated at 93,720,000 bushels, with a surplus of 820,000 bushels.
