**International Coffee Conference.**  
Washington, D. C., Sept. 5.—Advices received at the Bureau of American Republics indicate that the republics of Central America and the islands of the West Indies, almost without exception, will be represented at the international conference on coffee, which is to be held in New York City early next month. The conference is the first practical result of the Pan-American congress held in the City of Mexico last winter. It will be convened by a resolution adopted by the congress and its purpose will be to study the production and consumption of coffee. Ways and means of protecting the American coffee industry will be discussed from every point of view and there are indications that more practical results will be attained than has been the case with similar international conferences in the past.

**New Way of Aiding Industries.**  
New Orleans, La., Sept. 5.—The industrial department of the Illinois Central railroad has taken a novel way of stimulating manufacturing along the lines of the road. The first move has been made in New Orleans, and as a result the city has passed an ordinance exempting all manufacturing plants from taxation until 1910. It is expected that the measure will attract many factories to New Orleans.
