MONEY IN FRUIT RAISING

FRUIT GROWERS UNION A COMPLETE SUCCESS.

Unions as Good for Farmers as for Laborers—Great Saving in Handling Fruit by Such Organization.
North Yakima, Wash., Sept. 8.—The Yakima County Fruit Growers' union, which has been in operation two months, is now pronounced a complete success. From a membership of 50 at the beginning of July it has grown to 133 fruit growers and about twenty more non-producers who lend their aid to the scheme. At first many growers of the valley looked upon the union with suspicion but so successfully has it been conducted by the manager it is predicted that practically all the growers will become members before the year is out or at least before another season rolls around.

Manager J. M. Perry makes the announcement that a great saving is being made in shipping rates. He says that last year it cost the individual shippers 75 cents per hundred to get their product to market while this year it is only costing an average of 22 1/2 cents. The union is now shipping from 20,000 to 30,000 pounds of produce a day, which is expected to materially increase before the month is out. The success lies in the fact, that by combining the product is scattered and all the markets are kept well supplied.

Besides the large amount of fruit sent out by freight over 200 boxes a day go out by express on special contracts. For the first time in the history of fruit shipments a carload of pears goes out from this place each day. This is double that sent out last year. The reason for this increase in the pear shipments is that returns are now being received from the young pear orchards just coming into bearing. The fruit as a whole throughout the valley is better than last year and the yield is much larger, with unusually good prices ruling.
