**GIVES UP CONTRACT.**

Owing to Much Bad Luck and Lack of Laborers, George Schorr Will Not Finish Walla Walla Bridge.

George Schorr is in town from Walla Walla settling up his bills incurred here while building the piers and doing the concrete work for the new W. & C. R. steel bridge across the Umatilla River. Mr. Schorr says that the foundation work for the new bridge across the Walla Walla river for the same road, is about half completed, but he has given up the contract and the company is now finishing the work.

M. Schorr has had considerable bad luck in doing his contract work for the W. & C. R. Company on the foundations for the new bridges. Last winter, after having done several weeks' work on the Umatilla River bridge, the high water washed out the foundation and it had to be replaced at an additional cost.

M. Schorr says he has had all kinds of trouble this summer in getting men to do the work. On the Walla Walla River bridge he employed 90 men in July and 10 days of August, and at no time had more than 15 men at work. These he paid from \$2 to \$2.50 a day. The men were all hobos and would work a few days and then leave.

The company expect the steel here in a few months and then the new bridges will be placed as soon as possible.

**STREET CLEANING CRUSADE.**

City Officers Will See That Rubbish and Filth Are Removed—The Health of the City Very Good.

"Clean up your back yards." This is the mandate being issued today by Health Officer Dr. W. G. Cole and Marshal-Protem P. H. Fee.

Around every business house and place of business in a town there is always a lot of rubbish which if not looked after closely and kept cleaned up regularly, collects filth and the health of the people is endangered. This has to be looked after by the health officers and those who are more careless than others are ordered to remove the accumulation.

Every so often the officers make a tour of the town and make a thorough investigation and the people are compelled to use sanitary precautions. Today local officers are making this tour. Every back alley and out-house is being inspected and where there is any accumulation of filth it will have to be removed by the property owner or business man.

The officers are only making the business portion today, but expect to make a tour of the whole resident portion of the town within a few days and every citizen's place will be looked after.

**General Health Good.**

In speaking of the sanitary condition of Pendleton, Health Officer Cole said this morning that it was generally good and the health of the town was quite good for the time of year.

**BIG LAND SCANDAL.**

Uncle Sam Will Stop a Gigantic Steal in the Northwest.

A Washington dispatch says that investigation develops the beginning of what promises to become a great scandal growing out of the purchase by syndicates and individuals of lands of deceased Indians allotted at prices considerably below their value—an abuse which the Indian office is trying to check.

As yet, it is confined to the southwestern states, but the speculators are rapidly advancing westward and northward, threatening in a short time to penetrate every Indian reservation containing allotted lands in Oregon and Washington. There are strong intimations, backed by evidence on file, to show that several agents are in collusion with the speculators, and are inducing heirs to agree to sell at ridiculously low figures.

Commissioner Jones advocates the advertising of all lands belonging to deceased allottees, the tracts to go to the highest bidder, but congress must first sanction this plan. There are in Oregon 476,000 acres of allotted Indians' land, 372,000 acres in Washington, and 188,000 in Idaho, a large portion of which belongs to heirs of the original allottees, now dead. About 178,000 acres of Oregon allotment lands are at Klamath, 149,000 at Warm Spring, 77,000 at Umatilla and 33,000 at Grand Ronde, with the remainder at Selwitz.

Commissioner Jones says these lands are very tempting to speculators and, unless some remedy is soon devised, the Northwestern Indians will be swindled out of valuable possessions. No complaints have yet been had from that section, but are expected.

The most desirable lands in Washington are 51,000 acres at Colville, 17,000 acres at Puyallup and 211,000 acres at Yakima. The Lapwai reservation, Idaho, contains most of the coveted lands in the state.
