TEACHERS WANTED!

SHORTAGE MAY PREVENT SCHOOLS FROM OPENING.

Otherwise Umatilla Educational Facilities Are in Good Condition—Interesting Facts About County Schools and Teachers.

There is a dearth of school teachers in Umatilla county. County Superintendent Nowlin has requests from more than a dozen districts for teachers. Unless teachers are imported some of Umatilla's schools may not open on time this year.

"I have requests from 14 districts already," remarked the superintendent. "The applications are generally from the country districts. Three of these offer \$50 a month for teachers. While males are preferred, good women teachers will doubtless be accepted. I also have three or four applications for teachers in which \$45 a month is offered. Then there are eight or 10 applications for teachers where \$40 a month will be paid. Women will be accepted for these positions."

Schools Opening.

About 20 per cent of the schools have already opened and within a few weeks, if teachers can be obtained all of the schools over the county will be open. County Superintendent Nowlin will start out a week from next Monday on his annual official visitation of schools. Speaking of the condition of the public schools, Mr. Nowlin is well pleased with the outlook for the coming year, barring the scarcity of teachers.

No More Worthless Apparatus.

The buildings are all in good condition and very little apparatus is on hand that is not valuable. The schools generally have good libraries. A few years ago the school districts made some mistakes in buying apparatus but this is a thing of the past. The smooth agent cannot work the school directors on this proposition any more. Several were persuaded by those oily-tongued fellows to buy a lot of rubbish a while back, but when they saw it cast aside in one corner as so much rubbish by the teachers and children, they took a tumble, as the saying goes, and now the festive agent receives a tame reception.

Libraries.

There is some apparatus, it is true, but it is all of the practical kind, and then the school districts have been spending money, heretofore spent for worthless apparatus, for libraries. Most of the districts have accumulated good libraries and they are read with interest by the pupils. This is claimed to be one of the best auxiliaries to education now used in connection with the public schools. There is a total of 4198 books owned by the public schools of Umatilla county, and 627 of these volumes were acquired within the past scholastic year. Many of the districts are looking forward to the purchase of more books.

Teachers Should Be Paid.

Referring to teachers again, Mr. Nowlin said that he thought there had been a mistake made in some instances in not paying teachers better salaries; that in this day and time good teachers cost money; a man or woman, and especially the former, qualified to teach school could generally command a better price at something else. And the very place where they are needed is deserted for the simple reason that wages would not justify them to remain. "Too much stress cannot be laid on the importance of having good teachers," said the superintendent, "and the time has come when it takes money to get them. While the true teacher loves his work and does not like to leave it, yet he should not be condemned for leaving the profession, when the salary paid is wholly inadequate. It is hard work, and no one should expect to wear his life out in the work for a scant living."

past scholastic year, recently made to the state superintendent of public instruction, shows some interesting facts. There were 207 teachers engaged in the work in the county. Of these, 80 were males and 127 were females. Of this number, 87 held state certificates or diplomas and 25 of these were males and 72 females. Forty-two held first grade certificates, the males holding 15 and the females 27. There were 31 second grade certificates, males holding 15 of these and females holding 16. Twenty-seven held third grade certificates, there being four males and 23 females. Five females held primary grade certificates. Sixteen held permits to teach. Of these seven were males and nine were females. The average salaries paid these teachers were \$50.50 to males and \$40 to females per month.

The teachers all made a good showing, too. Of the total number of teachers, 118 held certificates of attendance upon teachers' institutes. Of these 37 were men and 81 women. One hundred and forty-one took educational journals, 43 males and 98 females. Their work throughout was good. There were few objections made.

Within the year there were 90 applicants for teachers' certificates examined. Of these there were 26 men and 64 women. Forty applicants failed to get certificates. Ten of these were men and 36 women. Four teachers' certificates, held by women, were indorsed.

School Attendance.

There were enrolled on the school register last year 6046 children between the ages of 4 and 20 years. Of these 3063 were males and 2983 females. Eighty-one pupils attended the public schools who were under 6 years of age. Of these 33 were males and 48 females. The number not attending school between the ages of 4 and 20 years was 1130, 567 of these being males and 563 females. Two hundred and nineteen attended school outside the districts in which they lived. The total daily attendance during the past year in Umatilla county was 414,879, the average daily attendance being 2644.

The average number of months taught last year was six and a half.

Districts and Improvements.

There are 107 organized school districts.

GENERAL NEWS.

The volcano on Stromboli, north of Sicily, is in full eruption.

The Filipinos are in a deplorable condition, with famine and cholera raging in their midst.

China has sent a minister to Cuba, asking that the Chinese be not excluded from the island.

Six hundred teamsters are on a strike at Chicago for an increase of 50 cents a day in their pay.

Brazilians are organizing to take forcible possession of the Acre territory now claimed by Bolivia.

The United States has decided to allow no liquor to be sold in the Samoan island, which she controls.

The democratic campaign was opened in Missouri Tuesday with a speech from W. J. Bryan at Joplin.

Kilauea, the great Hawaiian volcano, has also broken out in active eruption. A lake of hot lava has formed in the crater.

Volcanoes in three Alaskan mountains are in active eruption. The names of the volcanoes are: Redoubt, Iliamna and Augustine.

The Southern Pacific has planned a tunnel seven miles long through the Sierra Nevada Mountains. The estimated cost is \$14,000,000.

Governor Taft was recently banqueting by the liberal party of Manila, during which the native speakers complimented the governor highly.
