GROCERIES UNCHANGED-WHEAT REMAINS STEADY.

Prices Paid for Local Produce-Washed Fleeces Are Very Firm.

There is no change in the local with the market firm. Northern counmarkets for two weeks. Everything ties, cleaned basis, 53@55c; middle in the grocery line remains the same. Several different kinds of berries have run out and are taken off the list. Meats remain the same as quoted two weeks and one week ago.

### Wheat Steady.

The local wheat price remains steady at 50 cents a bushel. Little is selling, but not a day passes but more or less changes from the farmer's hands into the dealer's. Close esti-mates gives the wheat sold in Umatilla county since the market open ed for the 1902 crop at more than 1,000,000 bushels.
