tensive preparations are being made for the observance of the 125th anni versary of the massacre of Paoli next week, and if good weather shall pre been revealed. The Eastern market rules dull. Advices from New York yesterday were to the effect that everybody there was waiting for fusthousand people, including prominent members of the Sons and Daughters program will consist of patriotic music and addresses by several orators of note. It was on the night of September 20, 1777, that the troops commanded by General "Mad Anthony" Wayne, retreating from the battle of Brandywine, were surprised by the British general, afterward known as "Flintless Gray." The British general forbade his men to fire a shot, and to make sure of it took their flints away, whence his nick-name "Flintless." The night was in tensely dark, and the Hessians fell upon the Americans without a moment's warning, and bayonetted them only the genius of General Wayne saving the entire army. After the Continental troops had retreated, the sick and wounded were cruelly put to death and the camp burned. On the following day 53 of the victims were buried in one grave and during the remainder of the revolution the battle cry which filred the hearts and strengthened the arms of the patriots was "Remember Paoli." In 1877, just 190 years after the masacre, the present monument was erected over the spot where the patriots buried. 
