Two men perished yesterday and many more are missing as a result of the forest fires burning about Troutdale.
Harvesting is now in full blast in Harney county and the wheat is said to average 35 bushels per acre. Barley will run about 50 bushels per acre.
The people of Astoria thought the end of the world had come yesterday and fell on their knees in prayer. Smoke from the forest fires caused an unusual darkness.
A Deer Lodge, Mont. dispatch says that Tom O'Brien, who escaped from the state penitentiary three weeks ago, has returned and surrendered himself to the prison officials.
Burglars entered the office of the Groupe Lumber Mill at Dayton, Wash., and blew open the safe and scattered the contents over the yard. However, the robbers secured only \$24.
