NEW OREGON MINERAL.

Discoveries Made Near Sumpter That May Prove Valuable.

Baker City, Sept. 12.—A new discovery of molybdenite, a rare metal, is reported in the Buckhorn quartz claim, which is situated on the head waters of Deer Creek, about five miles from Sumpter, according to the Sumpter Reporter. The production of molybdenite in the United States in 1900 has probably not been over 15 tons, which does not supply the demand. The ore must be free from copper to make it marketable. The assays made of the molybdenite taken out of the above claim runs from \$400 to \$800 per ton and if the mineral is found 95 per cent pure it is worth \$3000 per ton.

The chief uses of Molybdenum until recently have been in determining phosphoric acid by ammonium molybdate, and preparing blue carmine for coloring porcelain. The Ferro-Alloy of molybdenum is now used in making a special steel to which it gives valuable properties.

Two Disappointed Spouses Seek Legal Separation.

Two divorce suits were filed on the equity docket Friday afternoon. Eugene T. Nickols, and Nellie B. Huggell desire legal separation from their respective spouses.

Eugene T. Nickols alleges that plaintiff and defendant were married in Denver, Col., in March, 1900, and in May, 1901, defendant abandoned plaintiff without cause or provocation and still continues to forsake and abandon without the consent of and against the wish of plaintiff. There are no children and no community property involved, and nothing asked other than the annulling of the marriage.

Huggell vs. Huggell.

After living together for two brief years, Nellie B. Huggell, the defendant in the above case, tired of married life and concluded that she would rather live without her lawful husband. As a result of this conclusion, she deserted Louis Huggell and left him to himself. Mr. and Mrs. Huggell were married in 1895 in Vancouver, Wash. In 1897 she left him, and since has lived separate and apart from him to the great discomfiture of plaintiff. They have no children and no community property which is involved.

DIVORCE COURT.

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National Athletic Championships.

New York, Sept. 13.—The eyes of all devotees of athletics are turned today toward Travers Island, where the annual national championships are being pulled off under the auspices of the Amateur Athletic Union. The entry list this year is large and of an exceptionally high class and there promises to be a smashing of records in a number of events. Geo. R. Gray, who holds the record of 47 feet for putting the 16-pound shot, will endeavor to establish a new record. Bailey, Westeny and Orton, the three famous University of Pennsylvania athletes just returned from Europe, are among the entries and will be seen in the distance runs, sprints and one mile championships respectively. Other leading colleges and athletic clubs are represented so that altogether the meet promises to be one of more than ordinary interest.

Odd Fellows at Des Moines.

Des Moines, Ia., Sept. 13.—With the coming of the morrow the Odd Fellows will own the city. Practically all the grand lodge representatives are here preparing for the opening sessions. Today the visitors spent the time chiefly in sightseeing, and tomorrow the sovereign lodge will attend divine services. Monday the first sessions of the high bodies of the order will be held with public exercises, chiefly in the nature of welcoming addresses and responses. Then the sovereign grand lodge will meet and transact routine business, leading up to the election of officers, which will be followed by a banquet. The grand parade, the spectacular feature of the gathering, takes place Tuesday, when it is expected that 20,000 Odd Fellows representing all parts of the civilized world, will be in line.

Union Veterans of Iowa.

Des Moines, Ia., Sept. 12.—Thirty-five local societies of the Union Veterans of Iowa are represented at the annual state encampment and reunion which began in Des Moines today. Today was devoted largely to the reception of the delegates and the formal organization of the convention. The sessions will continue until next Tuesday. A successor to Department Commander J. W. Ellis, of Maquoketa, together with other officers, will be chosen. Between the business sessions there will be features of entertainment provided by the local veterans.

Good Thing for County Roads.

Tacoma, Wash., Sept. 13.—Today was observed as "Straw day" in Lincoln county and hereafter it is to be an annual event. Upon the appointed day the farmers are expected to turn out and haul straw to place upon the public roads. This is a plan that has been adopted by the various counties of Eastern Washington and the movement has resulted in a noticeable improvement in the roads.
