#### NEW OREGON MINERAL.

Discoveries Made Near Sumpter That

May Prove Valuable, Baker City, Sept. 12.—A new discovery of molybdenite, a rare metal, reported in the Buckhorn quartz claim, which is situated on the head waters of Deer Creek, about five miles from Sumpter, according to the Sumpter Reporter, The production of molybdenite in the United States in 1900 has probably not been over 15 tons, which does not supply the demand. The ore must be free from copper to make it marketable. assays made of the molybdenite taken out of the above claim runs from \$400 to \$800 per ton and if the mineral is found 95 per cent pure it

is worth \$3000 per ton.
