OSTEOPATHY NOT MEDICINE.

Judge Brentz of Walla Walla Decides That Those of That School Do Not Need a Medical License.

Walla Walla, Wash., Sept. 15.—The practice of osteopathy is not the practice of medicine, according to a decision handed down Saturday by Judge Thomas H. Brentz, of the Walla Walla county superior court. The case was that of Sidney A. Bartlett, charged by the local medical society with practicing medicine without a license. For several weeks the matter has been in the courts of this county. After going into the facts of the case thoroughly Judge Brentz handed down a decision declaring that Dr. Bartlett did not need a medical license as he is not engaged in the practice of medicine according to the laws of the state of Washington. The decision will be of interest all over the state, as osteopaths are practicing in most of the cities and towns, and it is said a number of cases are now pending against them.

Electrical Piano.
