A TRACY POOL.

Referred to the Initiative and Referendum.

At last there has been a settlement of the question of who is to have the pot, in the pools sold in Corvallis on the capture of Tracy, when the outlaw was at large. It so happened, it may be remembered that one man held tickets for the killing or capture to occur on the first five days of August, while the tickets of another were a mortgage on all time thereafter. It also happened that Tracy shot himself on the 5th, and that his body was found on the 6th. Some of the 20 persons in the pool held that the finding of the body was the act necessary to constitute the title to the pot, while others that the killing settled the business.

The question was exhaustively considered and ably argued from both standpoint. The immortality of the soul was never discussed with greater scrutiny and finesse than were the fine points involved in this question about the pool pot. The debate was on for about a month and the more they argued, the wider apart they got.

It was then that the referee had a happy thought. He conjured up the initiative and referendum as a means of settling the question. Friday night, after a popular vote by the ticket holders, a count of the ballot gave the pot, by a vote of nine to six to the man who held the tickets for the capture to take place on the first five days of August.—Corvallis Times.

KILLING YOUNG BIRDS.

Game Laws a Dead Letter in Many Places—Brutal Hunters Destroying Game.

A closer observance of the game laws is necessary if the last vestige of game birds and beasts is not soon to disappear from the West. In Walla Walla county the law is observed. This year, in particular, it has been enforced, but in many other sections of the Northwest the game laws are almost a dead letter. So little attention is given them that before the grouse and pheasants are old enough to fly they are hunted and the old birds are killed. To Investigate Missions in Far East.

New York, Sept. 13.—The Rev. George F. Pentecost, who is to go to the Philippines, China and Japan as the special representative of the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions and the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions, started today on his long journey. Dr. Pentecost's mission is a unique one. Explaining it, on the eve of his departure today, he said: "My mission to the East is not to be classed with the regular routine of missionary work, and my duties will be very different from those of a foreign missionary. I suppose I am, in a sense, a special commissioner, sent to do special work. From London I go directly to Manila and shall be in the Philippines until Feb. 1. The succeeding two months will be spent in China, after which I shall spend four months in Japan. My work will be, primarily, to enlist the English and American residents of the East in the cause of Christ." Dr. Pentecost is to be supported jointly by the Presbyterian and Congregational boards.
