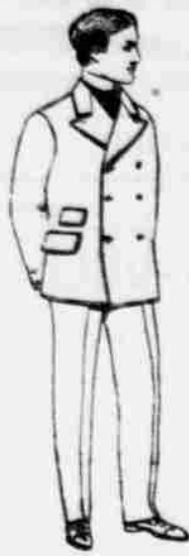

GENERAL NEWS.

The Union Pacific has been granted an injunction restraining the strikers from placing pickets around their shops at Omaha.

Throughout the United States the anniversary of the death of President McKinley was generally observed by services in churches.

One hundred machinists helpers in the shops of the M. K. & T. at Dennison, Texas, have struck for a 15 per cent advance in wages.

An edict has gone forth in Salt Lake City stating that no newly married women will be employed by the board of education to teach in the schools of that city.

Churches in New York have begun to adopt resolutions demanding arbitration in the coal strike situation. The First Union Presbyterian church was the first to set the example.

On account of the impoverishment of the people by cholera and famine, the United States commission has remitted the land tax in the province of Batangas, Luzon, for the year 1902.

In a fight between a force of native constabulary and the Rio band of r-recognizables in Tayabas, Luzon, 18 of the band were killed and 25 captured. The constabulary suffered no loss.

The burning gusher at Beaumont, Texas, ceased flowing of its own accord yesterday, and the fire was easily extinguished. A smoldering fire at the big tank is all that remains of the flames.

The closing of the mills of the cotton duck trust at New Hartford, Conn., has practically ruined the town. The object of the move is to relocate in the South, where the laws will permit the use of child labor.

Favorable progress has been reported in the treatment of 10 cases of leprosy now in the hospital at Havana, Cuba. The disease is being treated with a saline and tonic made from mangrove extract which is proving very effective.

William H. Stratton, the discoverer of Cripple Creek, and one of the wealthiest men in the state of Colorado, died at his home in Colorado Springs last night. He was a man whose private charities were boundless, and his interest in public welfare was without limit.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

What is said to be a very strong ticket, was nominated by the Chehalis, Wash. county democrats in convention Saturday.

A raid was made on the saloon at the entrance of the Presidio, Cal., reservation last night and 23 soldiers and 10 civilians were arrested.

The grain crop in the Palouse country will be fully as large this year as it was last. About two-thirds of the crop has been harvested and the grain is being rapidly stored in the warehouses.

Harney county, according to the assessor's returns filed last week, has 5517 horses, 54,789 cattle, 60,525 sheep and 344 head of swine. The total value of the taxable property in the county is \$2,197,625.

The postoffice department has issued a general order directing all mails for trans-Pacific destinations hereafter to be forwarded by the steamer to sail first without regard to whether such steamer sails from San Francisco, Seattle or Vancouver.

R. P. Brown, Captain of the Pendleton Baseball Team, Presented With a Gold Watch.

R. P. Brown is probably the best tickled man in town. At the book store of L. G. Frazier, he was presented with a fine gold-filled and gold-jeweled engraved hunting case watch by the local baseball fans as a token of their appreciation of the good work he did as captain of the Pendleton baseball team.

The movement to present Mr. Brown with something as a memento of his work on the diamond for the Pendleton Indians, was started a few days ago by Roy Ritner and George Hartman, two of the most enthusiastic fans in town. It only took them a few hours to decide what they would present to Mr. Brown and to raise the necessary money from his admiring friends to purchase the watch. The timepiece was purchased of Louis Hunziker and on the front of the case was engraved the monogram, "R. P. P." and inside the back of the case the words: "Presented to R. B. Brown by Baseball Fans, Pendleton, Ore., 1902."

Mr. Ritner made the presentation in the presence of quite a number of friends, and Mr. Brown was so surprised and taken back that he could only utter his appreciative thanks by a great effort.

HORSE FALLS DEAD.

Badly Injures Rider, Who is Well Known, Horsebuyer.

Baker City, Sept. 16.—Charles Prescott a horsebuyer whose home is at Union, sustained a severe fracture of his right leg, below the knee yesterday morning through his riding horse falling upon him when enroute home and passing the home of Councilman James York, upon the east side. Mr. Prescott was removed to St. Elizabeth hospital. Dr. W. T. Phy was then called and the injured leg set. At last accounts Mr. Prescott was in less pain.

From particulars gleaned it seems that Mr. Prescott arrived in the city last night after a trip through Idaho. He started for home this morning and when opposite Mr. York's home the animal fell dead, presumably from heart disease. The rider was caught beneath the horse's body and the limb broken. The unfortunate man's face was scratched and bruised somewhat but no internal injuries resulted as was first reported.

reported at 4:50, and so on ad infinitum. It does seem possible that those having the reporting of these delayed trains could better convenience and serve the traveling public by sticking closer to the fact and guessing less.

After a train passes Huntington there should be no great difficulty in determining the time of its arrival and departure at and from stations west of that place. In any event, it does seem reasonable to expect that the reports from the depot would be within a half hour of the correct time and would not have to be changed as each hour passed and extended until even the face of the clock was tired from exertion of recording the different guesses.

Doubtless there are all kinds of reasons for the trains being late, but there is barely any reason for failure to report their arrival and departure at somewhere near the correct time after the trains are west of Huntington, and it should be done with the desire uppermost to serve the traveling public.
