**WALLA WALLA NOTES.**

**David McMillan Dead—Will of Colonel Puffer Filed in Superior Court.**  
Walla Walla, Sept. 16.—David McMillan, aged 55 years, died at the county poor farm yesterday, of paralysis. McMillan had been paralyzed in his lower limbs for eight years, and had been practically helpless all that time. He came here from Canada, and had no relatives in this country, so far as anyone here knows. His case was a sad one indeed, yet he bore up with fortitude to the last.

The will of Colonel A. J. Puffer, the wealthy farmer who recently died, leaving a large estate and no children, was filed in the superior court yesterday. All the personal property goes to Mrs. Puffer, and the real estate is her's during her life-time. After her death the land is to be divided between a number of sisters, nephews and nieces. J. L. Sharpstein, a local attorney, is named as administrator without bond. The estate consists of large tracts of wheat lands and other parts of the state.

The line will not run in a straight line but will zigzag so that a number of prominent farmers living within reasonable distance of the route may connect their residences. Messrs. **Odd Fellows Keep Busy.**

Des Moines, Ia., Sept. 16.—The public was excluded from today's session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge of Odd Fellows in accordance with custom, but the visitors found sufficient to occupy their attention. At the state fair grounds the Patriarchs held a dress parade and made a royal show in the presence of a crowd that thronged and overflowed the grandstands. At tonight's big reunion of past grand representatives there will be an interesting program of music and addresses, the latter to include addresses by Robert T. Daniel, of Georgia, and Hon. F. W. Lehman, of St. Louis. Visitors from many parts of Iowa and neighboring states continue to arrive and it is anticipated that fully 75,000 strangers will be in the city tomorrow to view the grand parade.

**Politics in Connecticut.**

Hartford, Conn., Sept. 16.—The republican state convention assembled in the auditorium here today and was called to order by Senator O. H. Platt. The opening session was occupied with the work of organization and the opening addresses. The nominations, which include a candidate for governor and other state offices to be filled this fall, will not be reached until tomorrow. The withdrawal of Gov. McLean, who would have headed the ticket without opposition had his health permitted him to accept the nomination, has led to the suggestion of numerous possibilities. Apparently no one has a decisive lead, though the name of Controller Chamberlain is the one most frequently heard.

**To Consider Dominion Registration.**

Montreal, Que., Sept. 16.—An important convention of the members of the dental profession began at McGill University today and will continue until Friday. The principal subject of consideration is the advisability of forming a dental association, embracing the whole of the dominion. At present such associations are only provincial in character.

The convention will conclude its sessions tomorrow.

Harrodsburg, Ky., Sept. 16.—The handsome confederate monument recently erected in Spring Hill cemetery was unveiled today with interesting ceremonies. The event was attended by many veterans and their friends. The orators of the occasion were Judge Robert J. Breckenridge and Col. Bennett H. Young.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Sept. 16.—The democrats of the Fifth congressional district are holding their convention here today. The men most prominently mentioned to the nomination are: James Scully, of Ionia; Peter Danhof, of Grand Haven, and Charles R. Sligh, of Grand Rapids.

**Washington Democrats.**

Tacoma, Wash., Sept. 16.—The democratic state convention convened here today at 10 o'clock this morning with a full attendance of delegates from all parts of the state. The convention will name a state and congressional ticket and also endorse a candidate for United States senator.
