ISSUPERINTENDENT

THE UMATILLA INDIAN AGENT GIVEN NEW OFFICE.

Miss Mollie Gather Will Be Assistant Superintendent-Has Worked in the Schools 16 Years and Is Most Popular With Indians,

The Umatilla Indian agency has en done away with and hereafter the business of Uncle Sam in caring for his affairs on the reservation, will be under a bonded superintendent. The old agent Charles Wilkins, has been appointed to the latter position and Miss Mollie V. Gaither, assistant superintendent under Mr. Wilkins.

This change on the Umatilla reser vation has been under contemplation for several months. A special agent was here during the summer and after carefully looking over the field recommended that the agency be done away with, that the above appointments be made to fill the official places in the Indian affairs of the re-This change from agent to superintendent is not a new thing. For the past few years it has been the ambition of Indian Commissioner Jones to take the handling of the Indian reserves out of the hands of agents and place them under bonded superintendents, and already most of the agencies have expertenced the change. The idea in doing this is to eliminate the possibility of the handl-ing of the Indian affairs from the hands of politicians and get the work on the reserves entirely free from any influence from the politician or man with a political pull,

reservation. Mr. Wilkins will remain at the head and the only material change will be in name. He will continue to handle the business connected with the reservation and Indian affairs, while Miss Gaither will continue at the head of the school where she has been for the past nine years.

Since Mr. Wilkins was appointed as agent, four years ago, he has given perfect satisfaction to Uncle Sam's subjects and to those on the outside who are familiar with the running of the business connected with the reserve. He has made a good agent and will no doubt make just as good a superintendent,

Miss Gaither has been with the Umatilla Indians for nearly ten years and has made warm friends almost universal. Not only has she handled the Indian school with credit to herself and in such a way as to inspire confidence and promote the educa tional interests of the Indians, but she has many admirers among the Indians and whites who are pleased to learn of her retention as assistant superintendent and virtually as head of the school. She has worked faithfully and devoted all of her time in helping to build up the school and it is truthfully said that she has succeeded. No other person could have done better under the circumstances. She has devoted the past 16 years of her life to work among Indians and there is perhaps no better fitted person anywhere to fill the place she fills. Under her care and by the aid of Mr. Wilkins, the Umatilla Indians have made rapid advancement. It is an established fact that the Indians, as a rule, have no ambition for an education, and it takes continual watchfulness and of the agent and teachers to get them to school, and then to get them to learn the best

there is at the school. Under the new plan of bonded su-perintendent the strife for Indian agents will be settled. Many have desired to succeed Mr. Wilkins and political "grafts" have been brought to bear to get his place, but so far they have all been of no avail. Now this strife is settled. The appoint ment of superintendent is perpetual as long as the superintendent gives satisfaction. He is responsible to Indian Commissioner Jones alone and as long as satisfaction in handling the affairs of Uncle Sam is given he will be allowed to remain. So will the assistant superintendent unless she
