# COMMERCE—TRADE

**Local Market.**  
There has been little change noted in the local markets since last week. Groceries are quoted at the same without a change and the meat markets remain as quoted for the past month.

Wheat also remains without any change although the present price is strong with an upward tendency, but locally the markets are at a standstill as the grower is anxiously awaiting a raise which is expected to come every day.

In fact, it was freely predicted at this time last week that another week would not see wheat remaining at 50 cents, but would go at least a few cents higher. While a few small lots are being disposed of every day in the county, very little, compared with the immense crop, has been sold in that time. The tie-up in the shipping facilities is still effecting the wheat movement. Charters are still low, but not enough cars are in position to transport grain enough to tide water to fill all boats now awaiting loads for the Orient. When a relief will come is only a thing to be guessed at.

**The Wheat Trade.**  
Portland, Sept. 18.—The wheat market during the past week has been a steady one. Sales have been made daily, but there has been no great activity displayed in securing wheat, as exporters are all paying a uniform price, and no great demand exists for the cereal. A great many holders are imbued with the idea that freights being lower wheat prices should advance, but they overlook the fact that the cargo market at London is dull and a great deal lower than a year ago, and the demand is not very brisk. Farmers that are selling at present are the ones that realize eventually more on their crop than those that hold for higher prices. The latter are eventually compelled to pay storage and insurance on the same and after deducting this from the results of the sale, find that he who sells early comes out usually ahead. There is no incentive for the exporter to try and load up, as nearly every house in the trade has plenty of wheat, judging from the receipts of

## WEEKLY CROP BULLETIN.

United States Department of Agriculture, Climate and Crop Bulletin of the Weather Bureau, Oregon Section, for the week ending Thursday, Sept. 18.

Portland, Ore., September 18.—The weather has been dry and very smoky in the western portion of the state. On Saturday the winds became westerly and the smoke drifted to the eastern sections, and smoky conditions became general in all parts of the state. The forepart of the week was warm and sultry, but the last three days were cool and seasonable.

The grain crop has now nearly all been threshed and the farmers in many sections are hauling it to the warehouses and mills. The yields, although generally below expectations, will probably amount to an average crop, especially of oats and barley.

Hop picking is drawing to a close; the yields are good and the quality is above the average. Prune drying will begin this week. The prune crop is variable; some orchards will yield a full crop while others will not pay for picking; those orchards on high land as a rule will yield the best.

Pastures are very short and the supply of milk continues to decrease. Stock in some sections is also beginning to lose flesh. The third crop of alfalfa has been secured in good condition with quality and yields up to the average.

A fair crop of pears has been marketed; apples have dropped considerably in some sections, but the crop will yield fairly well and be above the average in quality. Root crops all need rain, and potatoes will be smaller than usual because of the dry weather.

**Columbia River Valley.**  
Helix, Umatilla County, S. T. Isaac.—Dry and warm. Grain all in sacks, and being rapidly delivered to warehouses. Many farmers are preparing their summer fallow for fall seeding.

**Plateau Region.**  
Clarno, Wheeler County, L. H. Hale.—Hot and dry. Sheep coming out of the mountains. Grass very short on the range. Third crop of alfalfa very good. Stock on the range falling off in flesh.
