WHEAT ADVANCING.

It is Expected That it Will Go Several
Cents Higher—Short Crops in
the North Central States.

The price of wheat is looking up a
little. It is being quoted today at
50½¢, the highest figure it has reach-
ed since the first week after the mar-
kets opened for the 1922 crop.

While this raise is not much, it is
very satisfactory to the farmer who
has not sold and is thought to be
only the beginning of the raise which
will reach a few cents more before it
again drops.

Although little grain is being sold
at the prevailing prices the farmers
are now beginning to get alert and
the heavy holder of wheat is jubilant.
Although it is estimated that no less
than one-third of the entire wheat
crop of Umatilla county has gone in-
to the hands of the shipper there is a
large amount in the county yet
which will be affected by the raise
and an increase of many dollars will
be the result to the wheatgrower.

The blockade of cars for shipping
is becoming somewhat relieved, al-
though there is considerable of a tie-
up yet on account of shortage. This
will effect the price of grain to some
extent.

AN EXCELLENT RAIN.

During the early part of last night
it began to rain and the man who is
compelled to drive into the country
for the next few days will not be
troubled with dust.

The rain fell incessantly all night
and a great deal of the forenoon and
the dust is thoroughly laid. This

was very welcome to all.

While there might have been a few farmers
who were not just prepared to wel-
come the rain on account of having
grain in the field, the majority are
feeling mighty good over the down-
pour and the good it will do will
more than offset the evil effects.

People who have traveled over the
Umatilla county roads have com-
plained more during the past few
weeks about the condition of the
thoroughfares and the dust than ever
before in the history of the county.
The dust was said to have been deeper
and the roads cut up worse than
was ever known. In places it was
impossible to drive a team faster
than a walk on account of the holes
and the dust was not only blinding,
but stifling. When a team passed,
nothing could be seen but a cloud of
dust. Now it will be different. The
rain has been heavy enough to lay
all the dust and pack the roads. It is
now the time of year for good rains
frequently and they may be looked
for from now on.

The rain is not only welcomed by
those who have to contend with the
dusty roads, but the stockmen have
been praying for water to start the
ranges. Grass is getting very
short, especially where it had been
closely eaten off and the question of
a place to herd a band of sheep or
cattle was becoming a serious ques-
tion. Now the grass will start and
with a few more early showers the
fall range will be all that is desired
and stock will come off the hills at
feeding time in good shape.
