MADE A GUN PLAY.

Frank Ernhart Flourishes a Revolver Before a Crowd of Young Men, Who Made a Hasty Retreat.

Frank Ernhart and Mart Shackerford were the principals in a gun play enacted on Alta street, near Main, Friday evening.

It seems that there had been bad blood between Shackerford and Ernhart for some time and they met last evening with the intention of settling the affair. They decided to repair from Main street to a more secluded spot on Alta and when they were about a block from Main they stopped and began to talk the matter over. Shackerford had heard that Ernhart had been talking about him and asked him about it. Ernhart denied the charge and a friend of Shackerford stepped up and said he heard Ernhart do the talking. At this Ernhart drew his revolver and flourishing it in the faces of the crowd who had followed the two young men out to see the fight, invited them to come on and intimidated that if they did he would make short work of them.

Neither Shackerford nor his friends cared to have their bodies made a target for a revolver and they made their hasty retreat to safer quarters. This ended the affair for the time being. Ernhart was later arrested and will have his trial this afternoon.

Later.

Ernhart was arrested this morning and taken before Judge Fitz Gerald this afternoon. He had formerly announced that he would plead not guilty, but when he came to trial he announced through his attorney, John McCourt, that he would plead guilty. The circumstances which led up to the gun play was given the court and he imposed a fine of \$17 on Ernhart for carrying concealed weapons.
