GENERAL NEWS.

W. S. Stratton, a multi-millionaire of Colorado Springs, who died recently, leaves \$1,000,000 to build a home for the destitute sick of that city.

The tobacco trust, not content with the mere controlling of the product on this side of the water, are now working for the amalgamation of the British and American trusts.

Sixty miles in 40 minutes was the record made by Mr. Spencer, the aeronaut, in a balloon with which he ascended at Morley, Yorkshire, and came to earth near Thirsk.

Copenhagen advices of the results of the elections of members to the Landsting, the upper house of the Rigsdag, assure the ultimate sale of the Danish West Indies to the United States.

On account of the coal miners' strike in the anthracite region of Pennsylvania, New York consumers have been compelled to import between 20,000 and 30,000 tons from Wales. About half the shipment has already arrived.

The Southern Pacific company is preparing to receive 40,000 tons of steel rails from Germany. The reason given for the order being placed in Germany is that the foundries of America are too busy to accommodate the enormous demand for material.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The relief committee now have \$8,289.55 collected for the benefit of the sufferers of the recent forest fires in Oregon.

Diamonds were discovered lately in Harney county, on Crane Creek, 50 miles east of Burns. A company has been formed to develop the fields.

S. L. Thomas, a Hatton, Wash., farmer, has just completed the harvesting of a wheat crop of 100,000 bushels. There were 4200 acres and it took just 40 days to cut the crop.

Miss Louise F. Shields, who was recently engaged by the Young Women's Christian Association of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, to act as their state secretary, has arrived in Portland from Highland, Kan.

The Baker City papers are about the only ones who are deploring the recent rains. As a result their carnival pleasures were interfered with, the floral parade and the bronco busting having to be postponed.

About 60 acres of wheat and a separator belonging to William Labourn and David Spencer, two farmers of St. John, Wash., were burned last Thursday night. The origin of the fire is unknown. Both were insured.

The business men of Seattle are making a strong effort to pull the business of the Columbia River county in the Big Bend, to that city. The Seattle Chamber of Commerce recently visited that section 125 strong.

The lumber manufacturers at Everett, Wash., report the greatest activity ever known in the business heretofore. Mills are all running full time and some are unable to keep up with their orders by operating both day and night.

A memorial building is suggested at the Oregon Historical Society for the Lewis and Clark fair. The society will recommend it to the fair board, and it is also suggested that an effort be made to have President Roosevelt bring the matter before congress in his next message. The society will advise that the building be located in the city park of Portland.

BUSINESS OPENINGS.

Railroad Circular Announces Openings That Do Not Exist Here.

The Union Pacific Railroad issues a neat pamphlet giving valuable data of the towns along its lines and connecting lines. After giving the data, then the needs of the towns in the way of business openings, are given. Here is what it says about Pendleton:

Population, 5,500, an increase of 1094 since the census of 1900. County seat of Umatilla county, which, with scarcely 20,000 population, produces 1 per cent of all the wheat raised in the United States. Pendleton is 231 miles east of Portland. It has broad streets, a splendid electric light system, waterworks that cost \$25,000, two flouring mills with a daily capacity of 1500 barrels, and wool scouring mills with a capacity of 50,000 pounds a day. The town handles from 3,000,000 to 6,000,000 pounds of wool a year. It has churches of all denominations, three public schools and two academies, a live daily newspaper, a weekly and semi-weekly and a monthly devoted to livestock interests, and many handsome public and private buildings. Three dairies and creameries cannot supply the demand for their products. The two banks carry deposits running \$1,200,000 to \$1,500,000. There are three fine hotels, steam-heated and electric-lighted, besides numerous restaurants and rooming houses.

Novel Way of Extracting Money From "Good Fellows."

There are all kinds of "graffers" in the world, but a new graft is being worked in Pendleton, according to good authority. The story is that two men, one short and the other tall, stand in front of places of questionable character and watch for prominent married and business men to come and go. Occasionally they catch a victim and he pays them "hush" money, but they are more often turned down cold.

The plan of operating is to lay in wait for their victim and when he comes out of a place where he would not like to have the world know he had been frequenting, he is accosted by the two individuals, called by name and told that if he does not care to have his actions spread broadcast he would have to "make it right" with them by giving them "hush" money. How many victims have been caught is not known, but they are thought to be few. The police are working on the case and arrests are expected at any time.

A. H. Todd, of Meacham, was in the city Tuesday. Mr. Todd, who is a stockman, expects to bring his cat-

tle from the mountains this fall and pasture them near Adams.

Charley Ferguson, formerly of Adams, where he is well known, is now at Spokane and is well pleased with his situation there.

S. H. Forshaw, formerly a newspaper man, but who saw the error of his way and repented before the habit became chronic, was in the city Saturday in the interests of his nursery. Mr. Forshaw's mode of locomotion was by bicycle, and he had the misfortune to puncture a tire when near Eastland, necessitating a 12-mile "hike" to his destination at Pendleton.

WILL LEAVE PENDLETON.

Henry Shultz Has Purchased a Brewing Plant in Colfax.

Henry Shultz, who lost his brewing plant in this city a few months ago by fire, has bought a plant in Colfax and will remove to that city at once. The Colfax brewery is one of the largest plants in Eastern Washington outside of Spokane, and the price paid Alvin Schmidt, the owner by Mr. Schultz, was \$9000. Mr. Schultz has been a business man in Pendleton for many years and his departure will be regretted by many who have the business interests of the town at heart. He will assume control of the new brewing plant this week and is now preparing to remove his family to Colfax.

The July clean-up of the Le Roi mine, at Rossland, B. C., amounts to \$108,000. The ore averaged \$17.67 per ton.
