### GENERAL NEWS.

Telegraph operators from 50 cities met in Chicago and organized an international union.

The mill men at Minneapolis have asked for an eight-hour day and will strike if they do not get it.

Peter Olson, who had killed his sweetheart in Nebraska, was run down and killed by a mob yesterday.

It is claimed that great evil lurks behind the Cuban loans and that they are likely to result in showing up ugly scandals.

Rain was a blessing in Colorado as well as at many other points. It started grass and farm produce to growing, and also put out forest fires in many places.

Senator Hawley is reported to be in very feeble health, but that he is retained in the senate for the good that he has heretofore done for the state of Connecticut.

Dispatches from Chicago announce that the packing house combine has been arranged and that the next move will be to take the stock yards into a large combination.

A locomotive on the Southern Pacific road, blew up near Los Angeles and killed the engineer and fireman and badly injured another. The locomotive was drawing a long train of cars.

At a meeting at the city of Detroit \$1000 was raised for the relief of the striking miners. President Roosevelt was asked to attend the meeting, but refused. The mayor opened the subscription with \$75.

### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Chas. A. Cole, of Spokane, has been appointed internal revenue collector for the district of Washington and Alaska. His district covers Spokane, Stevens, Adams, Lincoln, Douglas, Chelan, Okanogan and Ferry counties.

Gus Kate, night marshal of Goldfield, Colorado, was shot and killed by burglars at an early hour on the morning of the 22d. Kate saw two men enter the rear of a drug store and followed them in. They opened fire on him, shooting him through the heart.

The officials at the local land office at Lewiston, Idaho, say there are a number of homestead filings on the Nez Perce reservation on which no move has yet been made to prove up, although the seven years of time between the filing and making proof has nearly elapsed.

Elma, Washington, has raised over \$600 cash for the relief of the fire sufferers, besides clothes and provisions amounting to several hundred more. Her sister town, Aberdeen, has also raised several hundred dollars, besides furnishing considerable lumber to those who are homeless.

The saloon keepers of Tacoma are next in line for a raise. The city council propose raising their license from \$500 to \$1000. The ordinance will provide not only for a \$1000 license, but will contain a number of other clauses that will regulate the saloon business. There are 194 saloons in Tacoma.

The wheat market at Colfax has eased off and is now down to prices that prevailed before the flurry and excitement of a few days ago. The prices now offered are 48 1/2 cents for club, 49 cents for the blue stem. Growers are not disposed to part with their holdings at these prices and are asking for a flat rate of 50 cents per bushel for all varieties other than blue stem. As a result the market is dull and sales limited.

## MELLMANN AGAIN

### SAYS THAT ELECTRIC ROAD AND PLANT IS A GO.

Has Been Busy at Work—Now Viewing the Proposed Route and Engineers Will Take the Field.

H. Mellmann, president of the Washington & Oregon Electric Railway, Light and Power Company, who it was thought by many had thrown up the possibility of building an electric railway from Pendleton to Dayton, and left the country for good, spent last night in town a guest at Hotel St. George.

Mr. Mellmann is accompanied by Col. S. W. Ferguson, a prominent capitalist of Los Angeles. Col. Ferguson is looking over the proposed route for the electric railway line and they drove down from Walla Walla today.

#### Viewing the Route.

They arrived in Walla Walla from Los Angeles Sunday evening and this morning hired a team and rig and drove along the proposed line to Weston. There they changed teams and drove on to Pendleton and the teams were sent back. Messrs. Mellmann and Ferguson returned to Walla Walla this morning on the 8:10 train. They will spend today in Walla Walla and hire another rig, drive out along the line from there to Dayton and inspect the country through which the proposed road is to run. From Dayton they will drive to Marengo, on the Tukanon, and inspect the power site purchased by the company to generate the power for lights and railroad. From Marengo they will proceed to Pomeroy where a contract has been let to furnish Pomeroy with electric lights from their Tukanon power site.

#### Says Reports Were False.

Mr. Mellmann is somewhat worked up over the stories circulated that he had left the country and the intimation that he had discovered that he had undertaken a bigger job than he could get away with and had left for parts unknown. He says he has spent the time since he left in the East and California and now he is back fully prepared to complete their contract with Walla Walla, Umatilla and Columbia counties and build their road. He stated further that the report of his being gone for good which originated in Walla Walla was started by personal enemies of the proposed road and he was here now to show them that he meant business from the start.

#### Why Milton Was Abandoned.

He also explained why they abandoned the first contemplated site for power plant at Milton. This move was one of the things which gave color to the statements that the proposition had been abandoned. Mr. Mellmann says when they first got their right-of-way in the county, or first talked of putting in the road Milton offered to donate the company a power site on the Walla Walla river at that place. They went ahead and had the place selected, surveyed and made the announcement that the first power plant would be secured there where the power would be generated for running the road and lighting this end of the territory with electricity. "When the people of Milton found out that we meant business, and after we had gone to the expense of surveying and making all necessary preliminaries for beginning work on the plant," said Mr. Mellmann, "the company was told it would have to pay \$3000 for the site. This was more than the company would stand and the Milton plant was abandoned."

#### Will Light Farm Houses.

Mr. Mellmann said further that they had secured a good power site on the Tukanon ample for all purposes, but they wanted the Milton site also. Power will be transmitted from the Tukanon plant not only to run the road, but for lighting every farm house and city residence along the proposed line.

#### Engineers to Take the Field.

Mr. Mellmann stated that he had secured the services of several engineers and they would soon be in the

field selecting the route which will be taken. As soon as a few more preliminaries are finished he stated that work would begin on the grading.

**Col. Ferguson Favorably Impressed.**  
Col. Ferguson is well pleased with the prospects of the new enterprise. He says there is no reason in the world for doubting that it will pay a good dividend on every dollar expended in putting the line into working shape. He claims to have interested in the promotion of several car line enterprises and in a few electric line plants and is well satisfied to risk the outcome.

#### A Pendleton Franchise.

Mr. Mellmann stated that the matter of a franchise in Pendleton would be brought up before the city council at their meeting Wednesday night.
