## STOCK INSPECTOR

### HIS DUTIES IN CASE OF DISEASED ANIMALS.

District Attorney Hailey Gives an Opinion at Request of Judge Hartman.

County Judge G. A. Hartman, having been besieged with inquiries in regard to the duties of county stock inspectors in cases of diseased animals, called upon District Attorney Hailey for an opinion on the subject, which is published in full as follows:

"Pendleton, Or., Sept. 20, 1902."  
"Hon. G. A. Hartman,"  
"County Judge,"  
"Pendleton, Oregon."

"Dear Sir:—Your favor of the 20th inst. received, requesting a written opinion from me regarding the duty of county stock inspectors in cases of diseased animals, and also stating that numerous complaints about diseased horses have reached you in the last few days involving cases of mange and other diseases in several places north of Pendleton, and in answer thereto I will state that section five of an act to prevent the spread of contagious animal diseases, found on page 1889 of the second volume of Hill's Code, provides: 'It shall be the duty of the stock inspector of each county and of each local inspector who discovers, suspects, or has reason to believe that any domestic animal or animals in his county or locality is affected with any dangerous contagious disease to immediately report such fact to the state veterinarian.' And the following section as amended by the act of February 28, 1893, provides that upon receipt of such information from a stock inspector, the state veterinarian shall immediately examine or deputize a competent person to examine all animals reported to be diseased, and if he finds such animals are infected with contagious or infectious disease he shall promptly take such measures as he shall deem expedient or necessary to prevent the spread of the disease and make other provisions regarding the suppression and eradication of the disease, and among other things authorizes the destruction of such animals after they have been appraised as further provided in the general act.

"Section 3350 of Hill's Code provides that the stock inspector of each county, in addition to the examination of sheep as therein mentioned, shall also examine, free of charge, any other kind of livestock in his county at any time he may be called upon to do so by request in writing, of at least 10 persons owning or controlling stock of the class he is by such persons called upon to examine, and such persons making a written statement that their stock is affected or infected with some infectious or contagious disease; and if, upon examination, said stock are found to be affected or infected with any infectious or contagious disease, or that there is imminent or immediate danger of the spreading of said disease, and that it will cause great and irreparable injury to other stock owners in the vicinity of said infected or affected stock, the said inspector shall forthwith issue his order quarantining said stock; and he shall engage a sufficient number of persons to hold said stock secure from other stock, and shall, if there be a state officer having charge of such disease immediately notify him of the quarantine of such animals, and if there be no such officer, then the governor. Each inspector shall have power to appoint deputies not to exceed one for each precinct for whose acts he shall be responsible, and by any of whom he may perform any act required of him by this act, except the semi-annual inspections, which shall be made by the inspector in person; and it shall be the duty of the inspector to advertise in at least one local paper, if there be one in his county, at his own expense, the names and postoffice address and precinct of any and all of his deputies."

"These are the only provisions regarding the duty of the county stock

inspector in regard to diseased animals, and from them it would seem that it is his duty to have general supervision over all diseased animals and report diseases to the state veterinarian whenever he learns of such diseased animals. And his duty as stock inspector applies as much to cattle, horses and other animals as to sheep, except that the law does lay down specific duties which shall be performed by him at certain times with regard to sheep.

### GENERAL NEWS.

The Indianapolis club has walked off with the pennant in the American association.

Portland is after the next national encampment of the G. A. R., but is finding difficulties in the way.

King Leopold refuses to meet his daughter, Princess Stephanie, and she did not attend her mother's funeral.

Joe Gans, of Baltimore, knocked out Jack Bennett of McKeesport, Pa. in the second round Monday night.

President Palma has plainly told the United States government that it must withdraw its troops from Cuba.

The nominee who will succeed Senator Henderson will be one of his followers—the Cummins men having withdrawn.

Secretary Root has ordered an investigation of the charges made against army officers in the Philippines by Charles Francis Adams and others.

The car has reached St. Petersburg in safety after two attempts were made to wreck the train upon which he rode. In one instance the train was derailed.

There was a total of 637 fresh cases of cholera reported in Egypt during last week. Since the commencement of the epidemic July 15, there have been 39,831 cases and 25,743 deaths.

William Hicks, the negro insurance agent, with whom J. H. Bullard, the negro lawyer engaged in an altercation which caused the disaster at Birmingham has been arrested on the charge of causing panic and will be tried by the superior court.

### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The city council of Seattle has appropriated \$200 for the benefit of the forest fire sufferers in southern Washington.

Ninety-year-old Lee Houser, of McMinville, attempted to board a moving train, and in consequence lost his right foot.

Frank Phelps, a member of Company H, N. G. W. made a remarkable record in range shooting at Spokane last week, scoring 23 out of a possible 30.

Last Sunday was a busy day for the city marshals at North Yacima. He nailed 25 traps and eight Indians for vagrancy and being drunk on the streets.

James R. Sovereign, the noted labor leader, was nominated for state senator by the democrats at Warrenton, Idaho, but withdrew in favor of another candidate.

Business men throughout the Coeur d'Alene country say the settlement of the lead troubles in that section means a business prosperity unprecedented in the history of the country.

Ed Hansen, a counterfeiter, doing 10 years in the United States penitentiary at McNella's Island, succeeded in making his escape from there Monday at noon. Deputies are in pursuit.

Agnes W. Marsh, of Portland, sues her mother-in-law for \$20,000 damages for alleged false statements against her character. Plaintiff says the defendant accused her of child murder, and other acts reflecting on her morality.

J. A. Ray, of Ray's Mill, near Elam, Wash., accuses two neighbors of starting the forest fires in the Harbor country by burning their "slashings" contrary to law, and paying no attention to the fire after it went beyond their premises.
