**Weekly Crop Bulletin.**

The past week was much cooler than the previous one, and not nearly as smoky. The night temperatures were especially cool, and frosts occurred on several mornings, which did some slight damage to gardens and corn on low ground.  
One good rain fell, which wet the ground to the depth of about an inch. More rain is still needed for pastures and crops, but that which fell was helpful in clearing the atmosphere of smoke, and in starting a new growth of grass. It came too late to do much good to potatoes, but some improvement in this crop has been noted, and with more rain soon better yields than now expected will be sure to occur.  
Threshing is still going on in a few localities, but the bulk of the wheat crop is threshed, and the farmers are rapidly delivering it to the warehouses and mills. Hop picking is nearly finished; the rains did no injury to the crop, but the smoky conditions prevailing during the harvest prevented the color of the cured burr from being as bright as usual; the quality is excellent.  
Prune drying is well started, and the crop is light. Potato digging and the harvesting of corn have also commenced. The corn crop is good, but the potatoes are smaller than usual. Pasturage continues short notwithstanding the rains. Cattle in many sections are losing flesh, and the flow of milk in the dairy districts is less than usual at this season of the year.  
Peaches are still marketed in Southern Oregon, and the crop around Ashland has turned out to be one of the best ever raised. Apples continue to promise well, especially in the Hood River district.

**FRUIT MEN OF GRANDE RONDE.**  
Will Petition Legislature to Amend Horticultural Laws.  
The regular meeting of the Grande Ronde Fruit Growers' Association held a very enthusiastic meeting yesterday. Committee on collecting stock to incorporation reported stock almost all taken. A commendation from Mr. Craig, general passenger agent of the O. R. & N. Co., relative to making an exhibit of products in eastern fairs was read, proposition accepted and next Friday the members will bring their exhibits which will be forwarded at once. All members are requested to bring such donations as they may desire to make. The O. R. & N. will carry exhibit free of charge.  
A committee on legislation was appointed to confer with the different members of the legislature relative to necessary amendments to state horticultural laws. Quite a number of communications were read from various fruit houses in the United States and England relative to fruit. There is a strong and growing demand for our fruit which demonstrates the fact that if the fruit men stand together they will soon be known and recognized by fruit dealers all over the world to a very great benefit.—La Grande Chronicle.
