ROP While it is true that shredded fodder

was not in general use before this year, still many progressive farmers and stockmen had learned its value years ago and have been using it with entire satisfaction not only through the winter, but all the next summer, says Farmers' Tribune. Professor Henry sent out an inquiry on this point last fall, and many reported that they had fed it to milk cows, stock cattle and horses with good success all through the summer. Since it has been determined that corn stover contains more than one-third of the digestible nutrients in the entire crop of corn, it is likely that a large portion which has beretofore been wasted will the coming year be harvested. While farmers are preparing new bins for their corn crop they will also provide a place for their stover. The term "corn stover" includes the stalks, leaves and husks-in fact, everything chickens, per doz., \$2.50 and except the car itself. Some farmers do not use the stalk unless a shredder is a part of the farm equipment. Cost of Shredding Fodder.

A subscriber of Breeder's Gazette wished to know about shredding fodder-the cost and how much fodder an acre will produce. James A. Parden of Iowa gave him this answer: Most shredders charge by the hour, but a few charge by the bushel. Those that shred by the bushel generally charge 5 cents per bushel; those by the hour charge about \$1.50 to \$2.50 per hour. It is cheaper for the farmer to shred by the bushel.
