### GENERAL NEWS.

A movement is on foot in England to make President Roosevelt colonel in a British line regiment.

The Illinois state republican convention indorses the candidacy of General Russell A. Alger for United States senator.

A wireless telegram received at Honolulu from the volcano of Kilauea states that renewed activity was observable in the crater on Sunday morning, continuing up to the present. The activity is not violent.

Catholics throughout the entire country have been conducting a veritable boycott against the publishing firm of Appleton & Co., publishers of Appleton's Universal Encyclopedia and Atlas, which they declare is unjust to their church.

Nome has been storm swept again with the loss of two lives and heavy damage to shipping. The dead are Captain Basil Danieloff and Captain John Slater, master and mate of the schooner Good Hope. The vessel was lost. Both bodies were recovered. Captain Danieloff's being washed ashore three miles up the beach from Nome.

It practically has been decided to regard the misuse of the American flag by the Venezuelan warship Restaurador as a closed incident. The ample apology made by the Venezuelan foreign office and the hoisting and saluting of the American flag by 21 guns is taken as sufficient explanation. As there is every reason to believe there will be no repetition of the offense, the matter will be allowed to drop. Minister Bowen's energetic action in the matter is approved.

### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The promoters of the Lewis and Clark exposition will ask the legislature for an appropriation of \$500,000.

The Portland Chamber of Commerce committee has decided unanimously in favor of the Blue Mountain forest reserve.

The Southern Pacific is gathering an exhibition of products in Western Oregon to be taken to the corn carnival at Peoria, Ill.

Roy Townsend and Otto Butler, two farmer boys residing at Willard, were fined \$15 each today for shooting Mongolian pheasants before October 1.

Sheriff Sitton, of McMinnville, today took Arthur Hotchkiss to the penitentiary. Hotchkiss was convicted of horse-stealing. His sentence is for one year.

Collector of the Port Stratton, at San Francisco, refused to admit free of duty a duplicate shaft made in British Columbia for the Colombian gunboat Bogota.

One fatality has resulted from the burning of the river steamer Modoc, at San Francisco last Tuesday. Mrs. Elizabeth Peterson succumbed last night from injuries received in the fire.

Collector of Customs Stratton has been notified that his decision in the case of Mrs. H. D. Green, of Portland, has been sustained. Mrs. Green was recently fined \$571 for not stating dutiable contents of her trunk when she returned from Japan.

Judge Rice has sentenced Joe Dillon, of Centralia, charged with attempted criminal assault, to six years in the penitentiary. The attorneys for G. D. Carpenter, of Dryad, who was convicted of a similar offense, have moved for a new trial.

### TO ADVERTISE PENDLETON.

#### Several Plans Proposed to Attract Homeseekers' Attention.

A great deal is being said about advertising Eastern Oregon and especially is the matter being agitated in Pendleton. The O. R. & N. Company is doing all in its power to get the people of Pendleton to have some printed matter gotten out for circulation by their immigration agents through the East and Middle States.

Several weeks ago some of the officials of the railroad company were here and called a meeting of the Pendleton Commercial Association to try and interest it in the matter of getting out advertising matter. The association promised to take active steps toward this end, but the matter was dropped at that and no effort made to do what had been promised. R. M. Hall, publicity man for the O. R. & N. Company, was in town yesterday and called upon several of the public-spirited men of the town to see what had been done and when he found that no steps had been taken toward getting out some kind of advertising matter to the East he frankly expressed disappointment. Mr. Hall said it was the fault of no one except the citizens of Pendleton that Umatilla county was no better known to Easterners. He said there was no better place in the world for the homeseekers, and if they knew of the resources of Umatilla county they would come here in preference to going elsewhere.

Mr. Hall added: "If the Commercial Association does not take steps at once to do something there are a few energetic citizens who will take the matter in hand and see that this country and its advantages are set properly before the Easterners. I had a long talk with Mayor Halley last night and found that he was very much in favor of printing small booklets, descriptive of the county.

"He is anxious to have the attention of homeseekers turned toward Pendleton. He thinks there are many ways in which to do this. The first and best would be to have literature printed which would be distributed by the railroad company, which promises to go to the expense of having it put into the channels where it will bear the most fruit, but Mr. Halley has another idea which could be carried out to advantage. It is to have something to attract the newcomers when they pass through Pendleton. A display of the resources of the county, arranged in an artistic manner near the depot so those coming through and stopping here to change cars for Washington points could see it, would serve to give the people a good impression of the county. This could be arranged at small cost. Then another idea which was talked over between Mayor Halley and myself was the idea of arranging a place to entertain strangers. If a room could be secured and kept at the disposal of strangers where reading matter and other kinds of entertainment could be secured, it would be of benefit. Many time trains come into Pendleton several hours after the train for Spokane has gone, necessitating those coming in on the late train and wishing to go on to Spokane, laying over several hours. If they had a place to spend the time or could be entertained and told of the resources of the county, they would be impressed with the opportunities presented and great benefit would be reaped.

The matter of advertising will be taken up again at the next meeting of the Commercial Association, which will be the 7th of October, and some steps will then be taken to get out literature or the matter be dropped entirely. For this reason, it is urged that all the members of the association be present.
