Ohio Republican Campaign.
 Akron, O., Sept. 27.—The Ohio republicans started their campaign ball a rolling here today with a whoop and hurrah calculated to be heard throughout the length and breadth of the state. The morning was devoted to the reception of the visiting clubs which arrived at short intervals on all regular and special trains. They came from Columbus, Cincinnati, Canton and other places throughout the state and they brought with them a multitude of bands and banners that combined to make a regular hurrah time. At noon the tallest officials estimated the crowd as one of the largest ever entertained by Akron. The speech-making program this afternoon and evening calls for addresses by Senator Hanna, Secretary of War Root and other leaders of national prominence. Chairman Dick presides over the demonstration and all other state committee men are in attendance.

Mascagni Coming Over.
 London, Sept. 27.—The American liner Philadelphia, which sailed from Southampton for New York today, has among her passengers Pietro Mascagni, the famous Italian composer, who is to pay his first visit to America, a land of which he is a deep admirer as is expressed in a hymn to America which he has just completed. Mascagni's orchestra and opera company have preceded him to the United States, having sailed from Genoa a few days ago. The great composer will be heard first at the Metropolitan opera house, New York, where he will conduct an orchestra expert to be followed by a performance of Cavalleria Rusticana, in concert form. He expects his "Triumph" which will be heard for the first time in America to make a strong impression.
