## UNION EXPERIMENT STATION.

**Board Extends Invitation to Attend Meeting October 2.**  
 Union, Ore., Sept. 26.—To the Editor: The members of the board in charge of the Agricultural Experiment Station, at Union, Union county, Oregon, will meet at the station October 2nd, 1902. A special invitation is extended to all members of the legislature from Eastern Oregon to meet the members of the board here at that time and see for themselves what is being done at the station in experimental work, hear an outline of the work planned for the future, and ascertain the aid needed from the state to make the station the success it ought to be.

The result obtained here during the year in experimenting in the production of grasses is in itself a revelation. One grass produced and brought to perfection, "The Oregon Brome," is said by experts to be worth more to the people of the state, than the whole amount already expended upon the station. It is not too much to predict that, with proper encouragement, in the near future his station will mature and give to the state a grass that will re-carpet the pasture lands of Eastern Oregon with a forage plant equally as nutritious and much harder than the bunch grass native to the soil and now almost extinct.

Here in the Grande Ronde valley the sugar beet grows to the greatest perfection in weight and tonnage per acre, and in saccharine matter and purity. Experiments in the production of beet seed from these beets at the station this season have demonstrated the fact that the seed can be produced here in great quantities perfectly matured.

Space will not permit us to go into details as to the experiments that have been carried on and conducted at the station this season, the results obtained and the experiments contemplated for the future. In fact, to fully appreciate all this, one must be upon the ground and see for himself. We are persuaded that the people do not fully appreciate the great benefits that must necessarily flow from the work of this station if it is properly fostered and encouraged and we are also persuaded that the members of the legislature from Eastern Oregon are also in the dark in this respect.

The work is a worthy one, and one in which every member from Eastern Oregon is especially interested for the reason that from it must come great and lasting benefits to every member of its constituency. We therefore take this means of extending to all members of the legislature from Eastern Oregon, and to all others feeling a special interest in the work of the station, to come and view the

work of the station here on October 2nd, 1902, meet and discuss with the members of the board the work contemplated for the future, and the aid needed to make the station a grand success.

## Makers of Cotton Meet.

New York, Sept. 30.—Departing from its usual custom of holding its meetings in Boston the New England Cotton Manufacturers' Association began its semi-annual meeting in this city today. The association represents 15,000,000 of the 19,000,000 spindles in the United States, and its members standing for a combined capital of \$345,000,000. The gathering will be formally opened this evening with addresses by James N. Dodge, vice-president of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, and J. Temple Gwathmey, president of the New York Stock Exchange. Among the subjects to be considered by the association during the three days' sessions are the following: "Our Foreign Commerce in Cotton Goods," "General Export Methods," "The World's Supply and Consumption of Cotton Goods," "Cotton Mill Expansion," "Cotton Manufacturing in Belgium," "Bleaching and Finishing of Textile Fabrics," "Tests of Cotton Yarn," "Mill Construction," "Overworking of the Cotton Fibre," "Preparation of Cotton for Carding and Spinning," "Automatic Machines," and "Tension on Roving Frames."

## Indianapolis Faces Hard Winter.

Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 30.—This city faces the distressing fact that tomorrow the supply of natural gas for fuel and heating purposes will be entirely cut off. For weeks past, or ever since the announcement came that the gas would be shut off, thousands of workmen have been engaged in remodeling houses and constructing new chimneys designed for coal or wood fires. Despite the unusual activity, however, it has been found impossible to build more than one-third of the chimneys necessary so that hundreds of property holders are figuring on withstanding the rigors of winter as best they can. It is estimated that not less than 20,000 residences have been built or will be built before winter sets in, the work affording employment for a large number of masons and other artisans.

## Wadsworth-Hay Wedding.

Newbury, N. H., Sept. 30.—Though the wedding today of Mr. James W. Wadsworth, Jr., and Miss Alice Hay, second daughter of Secretary of State Hay, united two of the most distinguished families of America, the function itself was characterized by extreme simplicity, in striking contrast to the lavish display seen at most of the latter-day weddings of note. Less than one hundred guests, and nearly every one of them a relative of one or the other of the contracting parties, witnessed the ceremony, which was performed in the drawingroom of "The Falls," the country place of the bride's parents, Secretary of State and Mrs. Hay, on the shores of Lake Sunapee. The officiating clergyman was the Rev. Dr. H. C. Hayden, pastor of the First Presbyterian church in Cleveland, O., who acted in a similar capacity at the wedding of the bride's parents.

## Louisville Horse Show.

Louisville, Ky., Sept. 30.—Larger and more attractive than in the two preceding years, this year's Louisville horse show opened today in a blaze of glory. Started two years ago as a local affair, the show has increased in size and importance until now it ranks among the best exhibitions of its kind outside of New York and Chicago. In the show this year all the most prominent stables from Boston to Denver and from Canada to the gulf are represented. Judging begins this evening and will be continued until the show comes to a close Saturday.
